THE ALPHA AND THE OMEGA

In Revelation 1:8, God says, "I am the Alpha and the Omega," the first and the last. At the end of the book, in Revelation 22, Jesus uses that name for Himself, the Alpha and the Omega. The fact that Jesus identifies Himself with a name that God used for Himself speaks beautifully to Christ's divine nature.

Alpha and Omega are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. The name represents totality and eternity, and in Jewish teaching the first and last letters of the alphabet represent God's glory. The Hebrews described this glory as Shekinah. God's Shekinah glory is God's visible presence for the benefit of the people. The burning bush (Exodus 3) and the pillars of cloud and fire (Exodus 13) are examples of this. So when Jesus says in Revelation 22 that He is the Alpha and the Omega, He's expressing that He is the glory of God who has come and is visible, for your benefit. He is God's presence in your midst. This is what John speaks of in John 1:14, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory."

This is the miracle of the incarnation. The Almighty and Triune God, in all His glory, came and dwelt in our midst, for our benefit. The Old Testament is filled with examples of sinful mankind unable to stand in the presence of God. Psalm 24 says, "Who can even stand in His presence?" So when Revelation 1:7 declares that God is coming with the clouds and every eye will see Him, that is a dreadful prospect for sinful man. But because God visibly came for our benefit and we "have seen his glory . . . full of grace and truth," in the Word made flesh, we have hope.

God made a way for us to stand in His glorious presence, and live. That way is Jesus Christ alone. In Jesus, we are not consumed by God's holy glory; rather, we enjoy His glory, and we enjoy it forever.

This week is unique in the sense that Christians just celebrated the incarnation, and now we ponder the close of one year and the start of the next. I love this week, because as we peacefully rest in His glory revealed in Christ, we look ahead to whatever the next year may hold, with that peace and with anticipation that maybe this will be the year that the Alpha and the Omega comes for us.
