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From the Pastor

We attended Angie's family reunion in Fayette, Arkansas recently. I had been asked to preach at the gathering. I was glad to do so and the Lord led me to share a message my father-in- law, Pastor James Asp, first preached about thirty years ago. I had kept the sermon outline in my notebook. Since it was his family in attendance, they heard his message through me. They were told it was his message, not mine. The Holy Spirit gave him the sermon—I just repeated it in outline form. It was a reminder to the family of their godly heritage.

The sermon emphasized the reality of sin and also the redemption provided by Jesus. Passages from Genesis and the Gospel of John were emphasized. The family was led to consider Christ and His Blood sacrifice provided for all of us. Library Notes



I am gearing up to return to library work in September. New books from the Historical fiction category will be added soon. Over the years I've reviewed, the writing quality has improved immensely, so give some titles a try if you have hesitated to read Christian fiction before.

Recently, there's been a demand for mystery novels. Many mysteries are thrillers or suspense, but the ones in demand are what I call "cozy" mysteries. They are an easier read and usually aren't as graphic as others. One author who has a trilogy in our library is Ann Gabhart, and I'm hoping to find other authors who have entered this market. I will keep you posted as it is a favorite category of mine too!

A couple of people are trying to read through our library, so I will be listing newly added books in the future. Right now, I hope to be gearing up for fall and winter reading as we tend to stay indoors. My wish is to keep books fresh by rotation, but I will also be culling books no longer read.

The NON-fiction category has excellent reading material! Check out titles in a handful of categories. The authors are fantastic, and the material challenges us on how to live in today's culture and to engage with others who have contrasting views. This makes them great companion material to your Bible reading! Though it is easier to find Christian fiction at your local library, it is more difficult to find Christian NON-fiction, so use your church library with so many current books.

Now You Know

When my brothers and I were young, we were allowed thirty minutes of free time after school before we had to start working on homework. Many afternoons, they (and I, being outnumbered) chose to watch "GI Joe". Most of the episodes ended with "Now you know. And knowing is half the battle."

In order to help everyone get the most out of the resources that the church uses, occasionally we will be including an informational article that explains the mechanics of one of those resources. That's my "Half the battle".

The Mechanics of Mailchimp

Helmar uses an email service called Mailchimp to send out bulk emails, called "blasts". This helps us deliver information in an efficient way.

The account that we have allows us 5000 "sends" per month to a list of up to 500 email addresses. If we send an email announcement to 200 people, that counts as 200 "sends", even though it is only one email. That adds up quickly, and every "send" over the limit costs us a surcharge. The analytics of Mailchimp allows me to see what emails are being opened, and by whom. This is not something I normally spend time doing, but can use this tool to investigate potential problems with delivery.

We currently have 6 "tags" or types of emails that we send: Devotionals (Fridays at 6am), Missions Updates (Tuesdays 6pm), Announcements, Events, Prayer Chain, Newsletter/Council Meeting minutes (as needed). You can unsubscribe from a tag that you no longer want to receive simply by clicking "unsubscribe" in one of those emails. If you wish to be added to the emails, or a specific tag, you will need to contact the secretary for a signup form. Mailchimp frowns on adding someone without permission.

Here's where it gets sticky. Every email service that you use personally, whether it's Google, Yahoo, or AOL (we need to talk), filters email blasts differently. You have to *train* your email service to allow the emails that you want to come to your primary inbox, and not spam or promotions, etc. This means that you need to look in the your junk folders and select the emails that are not junk and tell your email service that they are not junk. If you are consistent with doing this, you will get less junk mail in the long run, and relevant email will show up where you want it. For those of you with 4000 emails, you have work to do. That's your half of the battle.

Additionally, Mailchimp also "cleans" or removes emails addresses from our list if those emails go unopened for too long, or if they bounce (meaning the email address is no longer valid, or too full).
