Read: Isaiah 6:1-8 (ESV)

¹ In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple. ² Above him stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. ³ And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!" ⁴ And the foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him who called, and the house was filled with smoke. ⁵ And I said: "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" ⁶ Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a burning coal that he had taken with tongs from the altar. ⁷ And he touched my mouth and said: "Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for." ⁸ And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, "Here I am! Send me."

I. Isaiah 6:1-4 - Isaiah's Vision

- Isaiah has a vision of God's majesty and holiness: God is seated on a throne, His robe filling the temple, seraphim (heavenly beings) are present and they are calling to each other, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory."
- **Discuss**: What does this vision tell us about who God is? How do we perceive God's holiness in our own lives?

II. Isaiah 6:5 - Isaiah's Response

- Isaiah's first reaction is a deep sense of his own sinfulness and unworthiness. This is often the case when humans encounter the divine.
- **Discuss**: How does encountering God's holiness make us more aware of our own sin? How does this awareness lead us towards repentance and growth?



III. Isaiah 6:6-7 - God's Cleansing

- A seraphim cleanses Isaiah's sin with a live coal from the altar, saying "your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for". This is a symbolic act, representing the removal of sin and guilt.
- **Discuss**: How does God cleanse us of our sin in the New Testament? How does this change our relationship with Him?

IV. Isaiah 6:8 - The Call and Response

- God asks, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" and Isaiah responds, "Here am I. Send me!".
- **Discuss**: What does it mean to be called by God? How can we respond like Isaiah did, with readiness and willingness?

V. Application

- This passage paints a powerful picture of God's holiness, our sin, God's mercy, and our call to serve Him. How can we apply these truths to our lives? What steps can we take to respond to God's call?
- Let's commit to asking God to reveal more of His holiness to us, to confess our sins to Him, to accept His forgiveness and cleansing, and to serve Him with willingness and courage.
