Additional Notes:

Reasons for using the term "little children"

- **Term of endearment:** John expresses pastoral care and affection for his readers, indicating a close, familial bond between himself and the congregation.
- **Spiritual immaturity:** The term acknowledges that many believers were spiritually young or less mature, in need of guidance and a reminder of the basics of their faith.
- **Reminding them of their identity:** By calling them "children," John reinforces that they are "children of God," who have been forgiven and have overcome the world through Christ's power.
- **Encouragement against deception:** It serves as a reminder to not be deceived by false teachers, since those who are "of God" have the greater power within them to overcome evil.
- **Echoing Jesus:** The phrase echoes Jesus's own use of "little children" to refer to His followers, emphasizing humility and dependence on God.
