There are some things we learn & experience in waiting that we can't outside of it.

²² And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. ²⁶ And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. ²⁷ And he came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, ²⁸ he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said,

³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation

that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."

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Simeon's words reinforce God's faithfulness

Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; v29

Simeon's words reinforce Gentile inclusion in the plan of salvation

a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel." v32

Simeon's words reinforce the public affirmation of Jesus as king

that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, v31

"waiting for the consolation of Israel"

Waiting on the Lord is the heritage of His people

Justification (we are saved):

We are declared righteous & brought near by the grace of God

Sanctification (we are being saved):

The ongoing act of being made more like Jesus by the grace of God

"We're growing into who God already says we are"

Glorification (we will be saved):

The culminating of grace where we will inherit the fullness of the promise & work of God

Waiting well entails being convinced & changed by future hope

God's past faithfulness is the primary fuel for our present & future confidence

Glory in his holy name;

let the hearts of those who seek the Lord rejoice!

⁴ Seek the Lord and his strength; seek his presence continually!

⁵ Remember the wondrous works that he has done,

his miracles, and the judgments he uttered,

⁶O offspring of Abraham, his servant, children of Jacob, his chosen ones!
