

Sermon Title: YWCTW: Remembering & Serving the Forgotten
Scripture: 1 Kings 17:1-24

The Forgotten: consistently or circumstantially vulnerable people in need of advocacy.

God at work through calamity:

Now Elijah the Tishbite, from Tishbe in Gilead, said to Ahab, “As the Lord, the God of Israel, lives, whom I serve, there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except at my word.”
1 Kings 17:1

God confronts through calamity.

The sky over your head will be bronze, the ground beneath you iron. ²⁴**The Lord will turn the rain of your country into dust and powder;** it will come down from the skies until you are destroyed.

Deuteronomy 28:23-24

God cares through calamity.

Then the word of the Lord came to Elijah: ³“Leave here, turn eastward and hide in the Kerith Ravine, east of the Jordan. ⁴You will drink from the brook, and I have directed the ravens to supply you with food there.” ⁵So he did what the Lord had told him. He went to the Kerith Ravine, east of the Jordan, and stayed there. ⁶The ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the brook.

v2-6

Who provides food for the raven when its young cry out to God and wander about for lack of food?

Job 38:41

God cares for His people through ordinary & supernatural ways.

You are not forgotten!

“Can a mother forget the baby at her breast and have no compassion on the child she has borne? **Though she may forget, I will not forget you!** ¹⁶See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands; your walls are ever before me.
Isaiah 49:15-16

God at work through Elijah:

Some time later the brook dried up because there had been no rain in the land. ⁸Then the word of the Lord came to him: ⁹“Go at once to Zarephath in the region of Sidon and stay there. I have directed a widow there to supply you with food.” ¹⁰So he went to Zarephath. When he came to the town gate, a widow was there gathering sticks. He called to her and asked, “Would you bring me a little water in a jar so I may have a drink?” ¹¹As she was going to get it, he called, “And bring me, please, a piece of bread.” ¹²“As surely as the Lord your God lives,” she replied, “I

don't have any bread—only a handful of flour in a jar and a little olive oil in a jug. I am gathering a few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son, that we may eat it—and die.” ¹³ Elijah said to her, “Don't be afraid. Go home and do as you have said. But first make a small loaf of bread for me from what you have and bring it to me, and then make something for yourself and your son.” ¹⁴ For this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: ‘The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the Lord sends rain on the land.’” ¹⁵**She went away and did as Elijah had told her. So there was food every day for Elijah and for the woman and her family.** ¹⁶ For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the Lord spoken by Elijah.

v7-16

Elijah ministered to the widow and her son & was ministered to by the widow and her son.

“Until we embrace our mutual brokenness, our work with low-income people is likely to do more harm than good. I sometimes unintentionally reduce poor people to objects that I use to fulfill my own need to accomplish something. I am not okay, and you are not okay. But Jesus can fix us both.”

Obedience doesn't prevent pain, but it can further blessing.

God hears the cries of people.

“Do not mistreat or oppress a foreigner, for you were foreigners in Egypt. ²² “Do not take advantage of the widow or the fatherless. ²³ If you do and they cry out to me, **I will certainly hear their cry.**

Exodus 22:21-23

Some time later the son of the woman who owned the house became ill. He grew worse and worse, and finally stopped breathing. ¹⁸ She said to Elijah, “What do you have against me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my sin and kill my son?”

¹⁹ “Give me your son,” Elijah replied. He took him from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying, and laid him on his bed. ²⁰**Then he cried out to the Lord,** “Lord my God, have you brought tragedy even on this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to

die?" ²¹ Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times and cried out to the Lord, "Lord my God, let this boy's life return to him!"

²² The Lord heard Elijah's cry, and the boy's life returned to him, and he lived. ²³ Elijah picked up the child and carried him down from the room into the house. He gave him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!"

²⁴ Then the woman said to Elijah, "Now I know that you are a man of God and that the word of the Lord from your mouth is the truth."

v17-24

But when the set time had fully come, **God sent his Son**

You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, **Christ died for the ungodly**.

Jesus is God's answer to the cry of humanity & eternity.

God's people are to care for others through ordinary & supernatural ways.

God at work through us:

Schedule Remembrance.

Remember God's grace.

I cared for you in the wilderness, in the land of burning heat. ⁶ When I fed them, they were satisfied; when they were satisfied, they became proud; then they forgot me.

Hosea 13:6

Arrogance leads to amnesia.

Remember the forgotten.

All they asked was that we should continue to remember the poor, the very thing I had been eager to do all along.

Galatians 2:10

Pray for Direction.

Elijah was a human being, even as we are. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. ¹⁸ Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops.

James 5:17-18

Schedule Service.

I assure you that there were many widows in Israel in Elijah's time, when the sky was shut for three and a half years and there was a severe famine throughout the land. ²⁶ Yet Elijah was not sent to any of them, but to a widow in Zarephath in the region of Sidon.

Luke 4:25-26

Do for **one what you wish you could do for many.**
