God is not distant or uninvolved with His creation (cf. Jer. 23:23-24). Rather, God is intimately involved within His creation, yet He does not exist within any created thing (cf. Job 12:10, Acts 17:24-25). Since He is , in all places simultaneously, nothing is hidden from Him (cf. Ps. 139:7-12).

GOD SURPASSES HIS CREATION: HE IS TRANSCENDENT.
