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## A Message from Pastor Leslie

Dear Church,



Right now, my son's favorite song is "The Wheels on the Bus." All day long, he asks to sing the song together. He chooses the order we sing the verses and does the motions. The wheels, the wipers, the doors, the babies, and the mamas. Over and over again, all through the town.

In the gospel of Matthew, Jesus says that in order to be great in the Kingdom of Heaven, we must become like little children. Theologians have pondered for centuries about all the possible meanings of this passage and like many mysteries of faith, we may never fully understand until heaven. But living with a little child certainly brings this statement to life. I am sure God patiently offers us a hug when we metaphorically collapse ourselves upon the floor with a desperate cry because we've been told "no" (it's hard when you can't get everything you want). I'm sure it fills our creator with pride and joy to watch us play in the warm sunshine and enjoy the earth God created. To watch us use our creativity to make a mud pie or bake a cake, to color a picture or paint a wall, to stack blocks or build a planter for gardening. I think God smiles as we call out, "God, God, God! Look at what I can do!" After all, God has called the world and all creation within it "good."

One other thing I am learning from my child is his delight in doing things again and again. We get to the end of a book, and he immediately turns back to page one. He never seems to tire of the same episodes of his favorite show. The truck pajamas go straight from the dryer onto his body. We sing The Wheels on the Bus multiple times a day. Children love to repeat activities, never tiring of the joy found in them. We are now in Easter Season, it will last




until Pentecost Sunday next month, 50 days in total. Eastertide is meant to be celebrated as one single, joyful feast, known as the "Great Lord's Day." For 40 days we fasted, repented, mourned, and remembered our own mortality. On Good Friday and Holy Saturday we sat in the darkness and grieved that Jesus is dead. But on Easter Sunday we woke up early and found that the tomb was empty. Jesus defeated the grave! Sin and death do not have power over us anymore! So, we celebrate. Not just for an afternoon, or a day, or a week, or a month, but for 50 days. Over and over and over again. Like a little child, waking up to continue singing the song they started last night.

This month, may you be awestruck again at the power and importance of the resurrection. May you celebrate, whether for the first or fiftieth or hundredth time, that Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Amen!



### PNW General Conference Delegates

The clergy and lay delegates listed on this page were originally elected to represent the Pacific Northwest Annual Conference for the 2020 General and Western Jurisdictional Conferences. The first elect and reserve delegates to General Conference were elected in 2018 so they could attend the 2019 General Conference as observers. The other delegates were elected in 2019 after the divisive Special Session of General Conference held that Spring.

Due primarily to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the 2020 General Conference was rescheduled and rescheduled again before finally being scheduled to take place in Charlotte, North Carolina, on April 23 to May 3 2024. Over the longer than usual term of service, the delegation lost one reserve WJ lay delegate to resignation and one WJ lay delegate, Noriko Lao, to death. Lao was a long-time United Methodist and dedicated volunteer with several organizations including Habitat for Humanity.

In addition to its planning and preparations for the rescheduled General Conference that began in 2019, the delegation represented the PNW Conference at the Western Jurisdictional Conference when it met in Salt Lake City, Utah in November of 2022. At that gathering, they helped to elect three new bishops including Bishop Cedrick D. Bridgeforth – currently assigned to the Greater Northwest Area, Bishop Carlo Rapanut – an elder in the PNW Conference at the time of his election, and Bishop Dottie Escobedo Frank – from the Desert Southwest Conference.

After representing the PNW Conference at the General Conference, the delegation will also serve as delegates to another Western Jurisdictional Conference meeting July 10-13, 2024, in Spokane, Washington.


#### Remarkably Bright Creatures

James McBride (recommended by Judy Whetzel)




#### The Book of Charlie




### An Opportunity to "OWN A STEP!"

Trustees held their The monthly meeting on August 31st. One of the biggest concerns of the group gathered was the wooden steps

that are located on the South side the church. They have deteriorated and need to be replaced. It is felt by the trustees that continually fixing the wooden stairs is a losing proposition. Even more importantly is the concern that the

church will be liable for an injury. These stairs are used by church members, children and high school students that cross our property going to and from school.

The Trustees have decided the steps should be constructed of concrete. Three bids were gathered. The highest was over \$1900 and the lowest, from Meyers Concrete of Washougal, is \$1,138.



#### What is Passover?

Passover is a festival of freedom and this year it falls on April 22. It commemorates the Israelites' Exodus from



Egypt, and their transition from slavery to freedom. The main ritual of Passover is the seder, which occurs on the first two nights (in Israel just the first night) of the holiday. It is a festive meal that involves the retelling of the Exodus through stories and song and the consumption of ritual foods, including matzah and maror (bitter herbs). The seder's rituals and other readings are outlined in the Haggadah.

#### What are some Passover practices?

The central Passover practice is a set of intense dietary changes, mainly the absence of hametz, or foods with leaven. (Ashkenazi Jews also avoid kitniyot, a category of food that includes legumes.) In recent years, many Jews have compensated for the lack of grain by cooking with quinoa, although not all recognize it as kosher for Passover. The ecstatic cycle of psalms called Hallel is recited both at night and day (during the seder and morning prayers). Additionally, Passover commences a 49-day period called the Omer, which recalls the count between offerings brought to the ancient Temple in Jerusalem. This count culminates in the holiday of Shavuot, the anniversary of the receiving of the Torah at Sinai.

#### What foods do we eat on Passover?

Matzah, or unleavened bread, is the main food of Passover. You can purchase it in numerous stores, or you can make your own. But the holiday has many traditional, popular foods, from haroset (a mixture of fruit, nuts, wine, and cinnamon) to matzah ball soup — and the absence of leavening calls upon a cook to employ all of his/her culinary creativity.
