

Dear Church,

This month my "baby" turns 2! When I found out I was pregnant, I was surrounded by moving boxes as we were days away from moving to Vancouver, Washington for my first appointment as a lead pastor of not one, but two churches. I thought the exhaustion and nausea were from stress... surprise!

I was nervous. Nervous that I was going to have to ask for a maternity leave in my first year. Nervous about how it would be received that I was going to need flexibility as a working mother. Nervous that my child would be seen as a loud and distasteful distraction in the midst of an older congregation. I was wrong on all accounts.



In the last two years, you have surrounded my family with more love and support than I could have imagined. Luca loves coming to church! He has his Sunday routine down. He bursts through the doors and says hello to the worship team. Miss Linda lets him hold the remote and turn on the tv screens while they chat about whatever happens to be on his mind. Then we head downstairs to see what kind of pre-church snacks he can wrangle out of Mr. and Mrs. Forman. Back up to the sanctuary, he pulls out crayons and a coloring book to do some art

while people arrive for worship. Sometimes a friend will join him on the floor, like Robert Harris. As soon as Mr. Mark walks through the door, he jumps up and runs to get hugs. With a wave, they head downstairs to his classroom, a classroom that has recently been painted by volunteers and has new carpet because of a donation from a loving congregation member. Many people have given gifts for him via a baby shower, Christmas presents, and "I was thinking of you" gifts.

I am so thankful for the way our church shows Jesus to my son each week. Most Sundays, Luca is the only kid. But that doesn't matter to him because he is part of the church. 

Dear Church Family,



In latest news, our Church was blessed to give a total of \$1500 to the Interfaith Treasure House, which was 10% of our Holiday 2023 Bazaar proceeds. This was the largest dollar amount in history we have donated from our WUMC Annual Holiday Bazaar.

Additionally, we made a \$934 contribution to the Children's Home Society. Thanks to everyone's generosity during the Christmas Giving Drive.

This January and February storm damage was well managed in a timely and efficient manner by the Trustees' work party, led by Chair Joe Wittler. As expected, there were many limbs and branches strewn throughout our property. We also lost two trees in the area near the parking lot, one which took down the electrical cable for the parking lot lights. Our Comcast cable went down over the front lot, but continued working and Comcast has since placed it underground.

The process of disaffiliation of those congregations who voted **not** to be reconciling was completed on December 31, 2023. Our conference lost 6% of its churches, most from Eastern Washington. Zero churches left the Crest to Coast district. It was noted that new birthing of churches is happening in those communities that disaffiliated. The assets of disaffiliated churches were overseen by individual conferences. Our Conference did very well in comparison to districts across the United States.

The Crest to Coast Annual Conference will be held June 13-16th in the Seven Rivers District in Eastern Washington. A representative and an alternate are needed from WUMC. A Zoom option may be offered.



Here I sit on this blustery Sunday afternoon thinking about how blessed we all are to be part of a loving WUMC community. As we stand in our circle of love at the conclusion of worship singing Shalom (peace) I thought that we are a very lucky group of people enjoying the love residing within our walls and that we have the opportunity to take that love and peace out into our greater world. As we go in Peace and live in Love we have the string that binds us all together. When we combine that with our mission statement and choose to live it out in our daily lives our world can only become better.

With that said, I'm sure you all noticed the beautiful dresses going up on the walls of the sanctuary. Each Sunday in Lent, the beauty of the dresses will increase until we are surrounded in the DOING of

For the past nine years "Dress A Girl Around the World" mission has been added to our Lenten Season. Some of us got to wondering exactly what goes into each dress and what the cost of a dress averages out to be. Cleta Gilman and Chuckie Smiley put together some of the costs of making a dress. These costs are often offset by donations of cash, fabrics, trims, buttons and thread. But, for now, let's look at what the approximate costs would be for one dress, remembering that the size of the dress and specific materials will determine exact pricing. The prices below are configured at today's commercial costs.

A dress takes 1-1 ½ yards depending on size. Fabric costs between \$12.99 and \$14.99 per yard

Lace, eyelet or other trim costs between \$1.25-3.99 per yard

Bias tape costs \$3.00 per package

"Dress A Girl" labels cost \$12 per 100 labels making the cost per dress 124

One quarter inch hair ribbon costs between 104 and 504

Additional costs are for pellon (a lining for the pockets), buttons, one 2" and one 3" safety pin, 2 hair bands per dress, thread, cardstock for sizing label

Depending on the size and the materials each dress costs between \$10-\$15. It is noteworthy that those called to this mission refuse to make a sub-par dress. They believe every girl deserves a quality dress filled with love and prayer and a dress that can endure multiple washings in multiple conditions. (in a washer, on the riverbank, by hand, etc.)

\$1.00 is added for each dress created to help get the dresses from Dress A Girl Around the World headquarters to their destination throughout the world. Our cost each year depends on the number of dresses created.

In addition we have the cost of mailing the dresses to Dress A Girl Around the World Headquarters. Last year the cost was \$460.00.



So, if you, like me, are not a seamstress but you are called to support this mission we can do so in many ways.


- 1. We can help with shipping costs
- 2. We can find quilting fabric bargains at garage sales
- 3. We can commit to picking up one or two yards of fabric, or buttons, or trims throughout the year. It's fun to see how your fabric piece is incorporated into these dresses.
- 4. Let your friends and family know about this mission. Often times someone unexpected has a cupboard full of supplies they've been wanting to get rid of, but they want it to go to a good cause.



A collection jar is located in the Narthex and remain through Easter. You are invited to donate cash if you are called to help. I know your hearts are big and I know many of you will fall in love with this mission as you watch the dresses accumulate.

This is a whole church mission!
Our seamstresses are called by love and passion.




Holy Week






Holy Saturday In Silence We Await
