Ezra 7-10	456 BC	Ezra arrives in Jerusalem; repentance

#### Ezra 7:1-10

- Ezra was a scribe who was skilled in the Law, followed the law, and went to Jerusalem to teach them the Scriptures.
- The four-month trip to Jerusalem: April 8 –
  August 4, 456 BC.

#### Ezra 7:11-28

King Artaxerxes blessed and commissioned Ezra to return to Jerusalem.

#### Ezra 8:1-14

A list of the people who returned to Jerusalem with Ezra.

#### Ezra 8:15-23

- Ezra: "Ooops...where are the Levites?"
- Ezra: "We should ask God for protection on our thousand-mile journey to Jerusalem."

#### Ezra 8:24-36

They arrive in Jerusalem; the newly-returned exiles offer sacrifices to God.

#### Ezra 9:1-36

There's trouble in the camp – and Ezra weeps, mourns, fasts, and prays.

#### Ezra 10:1-17

 Ezra's mourning spreads to the people, they confess their sins and determine to make things right. All the people of Judah and Benjamin had gathered in Jerusalem. This took place on December 19, and all the people were sitting in the square before the Temple of God. They were trembling both because of the seriousness of the matter and because it was raining.

 A list of the men who had sinned by marrying foreign women.
