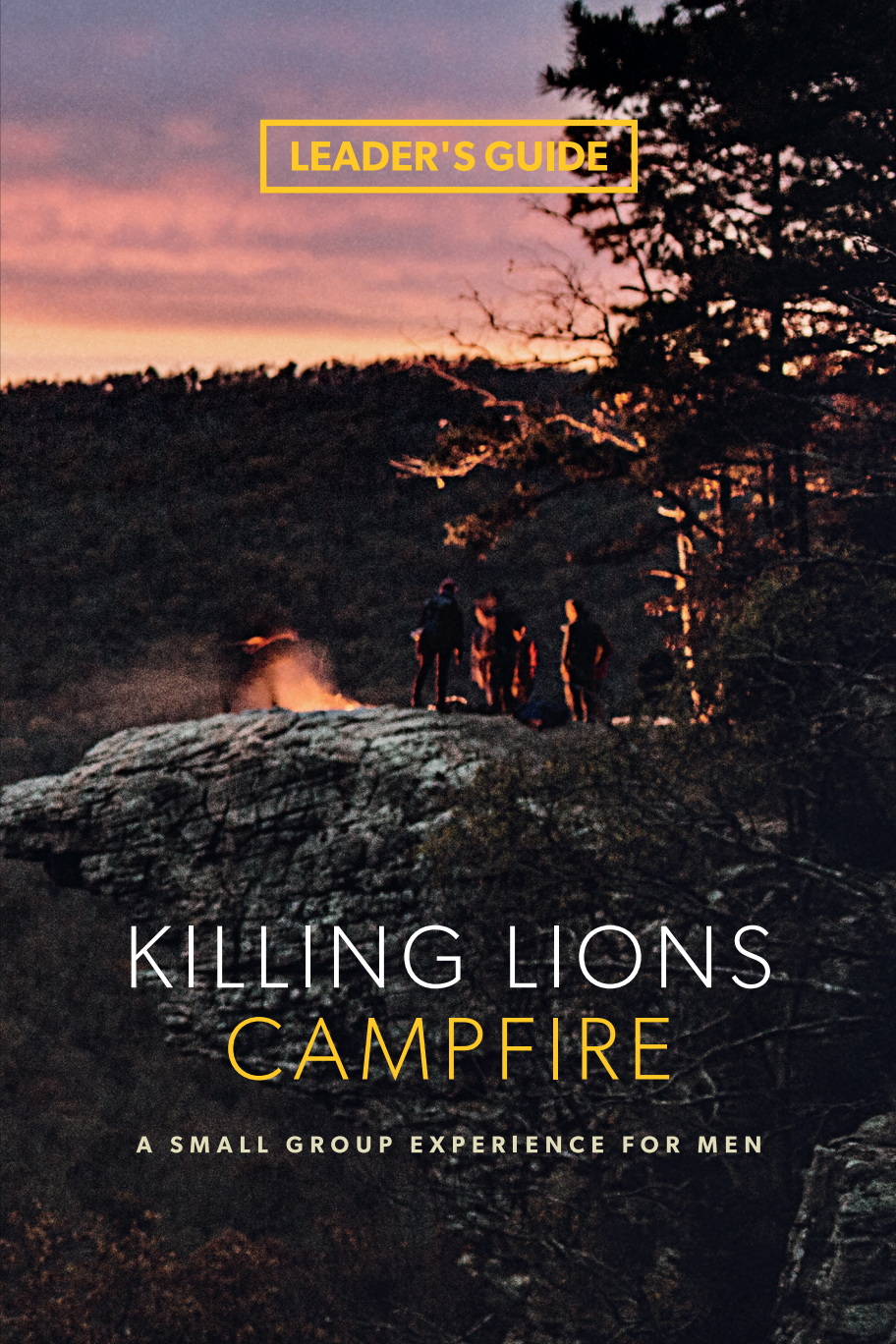
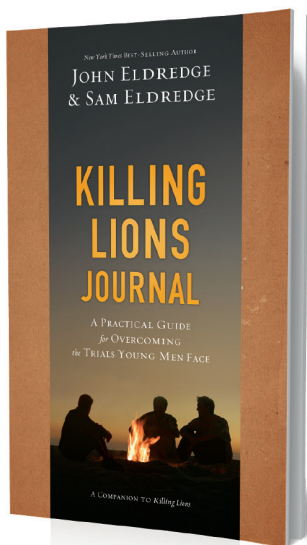
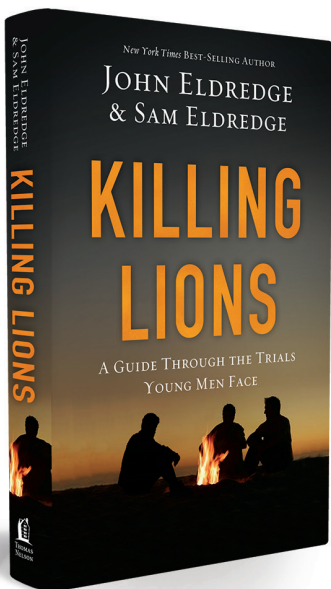

WELCOME

Powerful things take place when guys get together to talk about the masculine journey. We've seen it happen hundreds of times. *Men are hungry* for that kind of connection. This series is a way to facilitate those encounters and life-changing conversations.

You don't have to be a men's pastor or counselor to lead a group of guys through this study. Just invite a few men over, watch the DVD's, and talk about it. This Leader's Guide will give you what you need to prepare for the time and provide a meaningful experience. All that's required is a willing heart and a little courage. God will do the rest. Really.

Our book *Killing Lions* is subtitled, "A Guide Through the Trials Young Men Face." But we have discovered that men of every age love the content and the videos. So while this is targeted at men ages 18-30, don't let that limit what God puts on your heart. You might be an older guy gathering a group of young men. You might do this as a "mixed" group of older and younger guys. Maybe you are a young man yourself, and you just want to get your friends together to go through this. Awesome—God will use all of it.

The Pieces

We've created several resources to make this a powerful experience for your group: the *Killing Lions* book, some adventure films, this Leader's Guide, and the *Killing Lions Journal*. Allow us to explain each piece:

Killing Lions Book: Each participant will want a copy of *Killing Lions*. It's the core of the experience.

The Videos: There are 10 films for the 10 sessions of this series. In addition, there's an Introductory film that you'll want to show either at the start of Session One (meaning you'd show two films that meeting) or as a stand-alone first session if your group doesn't yet have a copy of *Killing Lions* (resulting in 11 total meetings).

The Leader's Guide: You're holding it—a simple way to prepare each week, with a handful of questions to guide your group discussion and keep things on target.

The *Killing Lions* Journal: Is a companion to the book and a tool to take your guys deeper, if that's where you want to go. It is not a requirement for this study.

Bonus Material: There are 6 optional films that don't correspond to any specific session but could be shown to the group if time permits. These shouldn't replace the film or discussion time designated for each meeting. Also included is a trailer to show at church or in the dorm to rally interest and sign-ups for your group.

A Few Tips. Here's some general counsel that will be helpful for each of your coming meetings.

Setting really matters.

- If you can choose a garage, basement, or living room over a church setting, then do it. You want an environment that's conducive to guys getting real. We recommend a campfire, if you can pull it off.

Good equipment is important.

- Try to meet where you can watch the DVD sessions on a screen big enough for every guy to see and enjoy. Get or borrow the best gear you can. (Then go outside and have your campfire for the conversation.)
- Test your equipment several hours before each meeting to make sure everything is working. That way, if something isn't, you can fix it or make other arrangements before meeting time. (You'll be amazed how the enemy will try to mess things up for you!)

Prepare.

- As leader, you will want to read that session's related chapter in *Killing Lions* and this Leader's Guide. If you choose to use the *Killing Lions Journal* you'll want to review that chapter as well. Then watch the video session(s). This will prepare you for what might be stirred in the hearts of your guys. You'll either want to secure copies of the book before the first meeting or encourage the guys to bring their own copy.
- Send a reminder e-mail or text out a couple of days before each meeting to make sure the guys don't forget about it. Let them know if you want them to read a chapter before the first meeting.
- Spend time in prayer before each meeting. You'll feel less nervous about leading if you do. In fact, the most important thing you can do is simply pray ahead of time each week:

Lord Jesus, come and rule this time. Let your Spirit fill this place. Bring your kingdom here. Take us right to the things we

*really need to talk about and rescue us from every distraction.
Show us the heart of the Father. Come for each man tonight.
In your name, I pray.*

Your honesty sets the tone.

- Be willing to answer questions personally, as this will set the pace for length of responses and will make others feel comfortable sharing. But don't dominate the conversation—even though you are the leader, you are also a member of this small group. Don't steamroll over others in an attempt to lead.

INTRODUCTORY SESSION

Read: Preface

Watch: *Going Soft*

Getting Ready: This is your group's first gathering.

- You can do both the Introduction Session (*Going Soft*) and Session One (*College and Then What?*) if the guys already read the first chapter.
- If they weren't able to read Chapter One, you can just show the Introduction film, priming the group with a simple first meeting.

On this first night, welcome everybody and do some quick introductions. Then, jump right in to watching the video sessions. This will help get things started on a strong note.

In the following weeks, you'll want to allow the guys some informal conversation first—say, fifteen minutes or so—of “hey, how's it going?” kind of banter. Too much of this burns up your meeting time, but you've got to allow some room for it because it helps build relationships and helps put the guys at ease. Then pray, asking Jesus to come and fill your time. Pop in the DVD. Then jump into the questions we've provided.

Big Ideas

We thought it'd be helpful to you as leader if we named what

we think are the Big Ideas for each session. For the Introduction, these are the key points from the video:

- Our culture has gone soft—so much of life is easy and comfortable.
- Every culture before ours believed that a soft world was not helpful in developing men.
- Therefore, we have to be intentional about our masculine journey—put ourselves in situations where we can be tested. That’s what the Moab trip is all about.

Questions

What struck you in the video—did anything jump out at you? (We almost always start with this question because if something did strike the group, or a few of the guys, then the conversation is going to flow if you let them say what.)

The video talked about our culture going soft. So much of life is easy, yet a comfortable world isn’t good for shaping men. Does this resonate? Where do you see that happening?

In the video Sam said, “In ancient African cultures, young men had to kill a lion in order to be called a man. When David faced Goliath, he was confident he could handle it because he had already fought and killed bears and lions by himself. I think that does something for a man.” This goes back to the Big Idea. Do you feel that need in you—to have that settled confidence?

The guys took that trip to the desert to be tested; they took on something as big as a lion to overcome. Have you done something like that to test yourself? What was it? How'd it go?

Luke said in the video, “Having men my age close around me gives me the strength to find my confidence—examples before me and support behind me.” That’s what we are after in this group. Have you experienced that kind of camaraderie in your life?

The guys road 31 miles their first day. Sam said though it nearly killed them, nothing strengthens the heart of a man like overcoming. Where would you love to be strengthened in your life?

Close

Remind the guys when the next meeting is; to read Chapter One; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



COLLEGE AND THEN WHAT?

Read: Chapter One in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film One – *Work vs. Dreams*

Getting Ready

If you did the Introduction as your first week, then this round is week two. Our guess is after your first meeting you were hammered with thoughts like, *That didn't go well*, and *I'm not qualified to lead this*, and *I want to bail*. Stuff like that happens to us, too. All the time. Remember: you have an enemy. He is an accuser. Do not make an agreement with those thoughts and feelings. They are not from God.

Before you meet, make sure you read Chapter One, watch the session from the video, and, if you are also using the *Killing Lions Journal*, read through Chapter One in that too. Test your equipment. Pray over the gathering before your guys show up. Then take a deep breath, and let it go—give it all to God. The pressure is *not* on you!

The Big Ideas

The big ideas from this chapter are:

- We are “re-framing a decade.” Young men are warriors-in-training.
- Character first—God is preparing us to be the kind of men who can *handle it* when our dreams do come through.
- There is a great battle going on—the battle not to lose heart as you find a life worth living.

Questions for Discussion

What struck you in the video—anything jump out at you?

Do you allow yourself to have passions and dreams for your life? Can you name a few? If not—why not?

In the video Sam said, “We swing between fear and entitlement. On the one hand I feel like I ought to take whatever job comes along. But then I feel like, ‘God, where’s this dream-filled life you promised me?’” Can you see both of those attitudes operating within your life? Which side do you tend to land on?

You are a warrior-in-training. This is the big idea of the chapter; in many ways it is the point of the whole book. God is far more concerned about preparing us to be the kind of men who can *handle it* when our dreams do come through. React to that idea—have you been looking at your life in this way?

John talked about the “great battle . . . the battle for your heart, the battle to find a life worth living, the battle not to lose heart as you find a life worth living.” Are you aware of that battle for your heart? Where is it raging right now?

There are basically four types of young men out there:

- Guys who are trying to jump through all the right hoops in hopes of landing the great job.
- Guys who are chasing a dream but are still boys inside and allow things to get messy.
- Guys who are lost and have given up on either finding a great job or chasing their dreams.
- The rare few who have accepted the invitation into warrior training—who see this time in their lives as becoming the young men who can handle life and dreams.

Think of the peers you know—how would you classify them? Where would you put yourself?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Two; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



BOUNCING CHECKS

Read: Chapter Two in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Two – *Money*

Getting Ready

Groups take some time to develop rapport and deep conversation. Things are still getting going at this point, so don't be discouraged if your guys haven't really opened up yet. Give them time. It'll come.

The Big Ideas

The big ideas from this chapter are:

- “The first thing Adam got was a job...” Men are made to be fruitful; hard work is *good*.
- Money issues really tap into our fear—will God take care of us?
- The World says “Chase money—money is your security.” God says, “Chase Me—I am your security.”

Questions for Discussion

In the book and in the video, Sam talks about two categories of people: the minimalists, who mostly deny material wealth of any kind, and their opposite, the “new American Dream” believers who want to be an overnight success and feel that wealth is there for the taking. Do you fall into one of these categories? Do the people around you? How does each camp make you feel?

How do you feel about the whole subject of money? When people start talking debt and credit and budgets and savings, do you feel more like a boy or a man?

One of the big points of the chapter is the idea that “the first thing Adam got was a job,” that men are made to be fruitful. What is your attitude toward work? Have you felt the satisfaction of earning your pay at the end of a day?

Now we are at the bottom line: what we believe about God. Either he is our ally, or we are on our own. What you believe about this affects everything else. Do you believe you have God as your ally, or do you pretty much believe that your life is up to you? What do your *actions* say?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Three; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



THE BOOK OF LOVE

Read: Chapter Three in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Three – *Searching for Validation*

Getting Ready

You'll probably notice that the video for this session doesn't perfectly line up with the chapter; in fact some of your group may wonder the same thing. In complete honesty, we didn't go into the Moab trip trying to get sessions for each chapter of the book. As this is a shorter chapter in *Killing Lions*, we felt that the pressing topic was validation, and we wanted to speak to that before diving into the topic of women.

By session three your group should be getting used to talking openly with one another, not just about the material but how it relates to their own lives. However, we always find there are a few guys who don't open up much. You'll need to begin to gently coax them out.

Don't pressure them, but for a few of the questions, make sure you turn to them and ask, "Dave, what about you? How would you answer that?" If he's prone to short, guarded answers, try to pry the clam open with follow-up questions such as, "Say a

bit more. What do you think was missing in your relationship with your dad? What do you wish your father had been more intentional about teaching you?” or “Talk about a time when your dad showed you kindness? Did that happen often?” Or, “If you could invite your father to do anything with you, and you were *guaranteed* he’d say yes, what would you ask him to do, and why?”

The Big Ideas

We divided this discussion into two categories: Validation and Women. At this point the big ideas for each are:

- Everything a man does is a search for validation.
- Most guys fall into one of two mistakes with women: They either take their search for validation to her, or they will run from her because they don’t feel like they can handle it.

Questions for Discussion

On Women:

Do you always need a woman in your life? Or do you lack the courage to move toward her?

Sam said, “Most guys down in their hearts wanted to step up and play the part of the hero.” Did this ring true to you? Was there a time when you wanted to step up but failed to do so?

We are haunted by Eve—by the design of God. Does this help you understand your masculine soul a little better?

On Validation:

Everything a man does is a search for validation. It's like a famished craving in our souls. Guys will do some pretty stupid stuff in their search for validation. Where are the guys you know searching for validation? Is it working?

The question isn't whether or not we are searching for validation—every man is. The question is simply *where*. So—*where* are you looking for validation these days?

And is it working?

Can you see how you might be going to the woman for validation?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Four; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



CHANGING THE SCRIPTS WE LIVE BY

Read: Chapter Four in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Four – *The Right Decision*

Getting Ready

The story of Naz's crash speaks to a lot of guys, because it connects with our fear of failure. The film doesn't directly talk about "scripts we live by," but you'll see the connection as we go along. This is one of the most important sessions in the series; identity is a huge issue for all of us. You might find your group needs to go a little bit longer tonight; great!

The Big Ideas

Identity is like the turning of the earth—you never really notice that it's carrying you along, but in any given moment you are actually hurling forward at 1,040 miles an hour. This is one powerful force. We cannot live beyond the way we see ourselves. When our world hands us a script, when we find ourselves repeatedly cast into a certain role, it requires almost superhuman strength to defy the gravitational pull of it. Those scripts come upon us from many

circles—family, friends, a coach, a church, our culture. (Killing Lions)

Breaking from our old scripts requires receiving a new identity from God our Father.

Questions for Discussion

Is this a new idea—that in many ways you are living out a script handed to you by the influential people in your life? Any idea what that script is?

When things blow up or fall apart, it often reveals our identity. In the video, Naz felt that the crash was his fault, something he deserved. Can you relate?

What were you rewarded for growing up? Was it for being kind, smart, obedient, athletic, etc.? And what were you shamed for, rejected for, punished for?

Can you see how you are working hard to be what you were (and currently are) rewarded for, while at the same time you are trying hard to avoid being what you were shamed for?

The video was about the decisions that define us. What decisions could help you break out of the script you're living?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Five; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



BACK TO LOVE, SEX, AND WOMEN

Read: Chapter Five in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Five – *Women*

Getting Ready

And so we come back to women. In this chapter, we want to focus on two things: understanding the heart of a woman and what makes for a healthy relationship. (This will apply to guys whether they are in a relationship or single.)

The Big Ideas

- A woman wants to be chosen; she wants to be wanted, she fears rejection, and above all she fears abandonment.
- Being a good man means taking care of her *heart*; its about her, not you.
- Healthy relationships come down to: Are you better because you are together? That is the first good test for every relationship.

Questions for Discussion

Sam said in the video, “I feel like a beginner when it comes to understanding the heart of a woman” What about you? What would you love some clarity on regarding women?

Start with our core fears, and you can learn a lot about the internal world of men and women...A woman wants to be chosen; she wants to be wanted, she fears rejection, and above all she fears abandonment. (Killing Lions). Did you know this about women? Can you see it operating in some of the women you know? How?

Are you better because you are together, or are you both stuck in the stagnant water of complacency? That is the first good test for every relationship—especially dating relationships. Is your effect on each other life and a growing maturity and wholeness? Does she move you toward the man you want to be, and is your effect to bring out her best and brightest self? (Killing Lions) In what ways does she move you to become a better man? Or is she pulling you down?

Taking care of her heart and taking care of yours will also give guys a whole new framework for thinking about masturbation and porn. It's not just, “Hey—stop it.” They are issues of the heart. I don't want to give my heart there because I want my heart free and whole, and because I want to be totally present as a friend and a lover. (Killing Lions). Does this re-frame the issue for you—that it's not just about moral rules but about the condition of your heart and soul?

If there are some sexual struggles going on, this small group is the place to talk about it and pray for one another.

Close

How you close this night depends a lot on how honest things got. If you know or sense that there are sexual issues going on, encourage the guys to read and pray the prayer for sexual wholeness we provided at the back of *Killing Lions*. It is really, really helpful.

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Six; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



DECISIONS, DECISIONS

Read: Chapter Six in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Six – *Older Guys*

Getting Ready

The twenties sure feel like the decade of decision making, don't they? It starts with, "What do I do after high school? College? Work? Stay home? Move out?" And the decisions feel like they just get weightier and weightier: "What do I do after college? Should I pursue this girl? Do I chase a dream or focus on my work?" We want to try and lift the pressure off, while giving you some really simple tools to help clear the air and bring clarity.

The Big Ideas

- The idea of "reframing a decade" is huge. We were never meant to figure life out on our own.
- Your options are actually limited—and that is a relief.
- There is a healthy process for decision making that we want to discover.

Questions for Discussion

Start with your immediate questions—what are you trying to figure out these days? What decisions do you have to make?

And how are you going about that right now? (This will shed some light on how you operate.) Are you avoiding making decisions? Stalling? Going with your hunches? Trying to please someone? Be honest.

How does the whole concept of “reframing a decade” change the way you look at these decisions? If you knew that you did not have to make the one right choice that will set you on a path for the rest of your life, but rather see yourself as God’s son who he is training, and this time in life is mostly about exploration and transformation—how would that shift your perspective?

How much of your false self/woundedness is actually fueling this decision (or indecision)? What are you prone to do when it comes to making decisions? Are you typically driven by a desire to please others? Are you ruled by insecurity? Can you name how your brokenness might affect your decision?

Ask yourself: *Am I holding back from stepping up?* As a man, this is something we always need to watch out for, given our core fear of failure and the DNA we got from Adam (who was paralyzed in his moment of greatest trial).

We were never meant to figure life out on our own. Are you letting older guys into your life?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Seven; and if you are doing the Journal, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



FIGHTING FOR YOUR LIFE

Read: Chapter Seven in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Seven – *The Darkest Lion*

Getting Ready

This is a critical chapter. Don't be surprised if you get hit with all sorts of stuff this week—distraction, irritation, reasons to call this session off. It is an attack—you are not blowing it. But yes, you had better pray!

Jesus, I take my place in you again tonight. I ask your angels to come and help me. I renounce the attacks of the enemy here—in my life and in this group. I bring the triumph against everything the enemy is throwing at me. Strengthen me, Lord. I put on your armor. Guide me and prepare me for this session. In your name.

The Big Ideas

Men, this might be the most critical chapter of all because it holds the keys to so many other realms of life—relationships, dreams, decision making. Even money issues. We were born into a savage war. This must become central to how we interpret

our lives because the enemy doesn't stop assaulting simply because we choose to ignore him. It might be a good idea to pray as a group before jumping in:

Jesus, we take our place in you right now. We ask your love and your life to fill us and surround us. Open our eyes, Lord, to the battle raging against us. Give us eyes to see what is really going on here. We ask your Spirit to bring us to the truth of this chapter on warfare. Strengthen the warrior in us. In your name, amen.

Questions for Discussion

Sam confessed that even at a Christian College spiritual warfare was not a category. Has this been a category for you—why or why not?

In the video, Blaine talked about having nightmares about falling. How has the enemy been attacking you?

Sam said, "It comes at first through accusation and discouragement, shame and isolation." Can you see that operating in your life? Have you interpreted it as an attack...or just your "stuff?"

Just let it all be true for a moment—what would the reality of the battle do to your interpretation of events, of your life?

Describe a very real battle in your life. Talk about the role of warfare in it. Pray together to break the attack! (There is so much power in praying together. As Jesus said in Matthew 16:19, "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven.")

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Eight; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



A FEW QUESTIONS ABOUT GOD

Read: Chapter Eight in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Eight – *Finding a Life with God*

Getting Ready

This chapter deals with two realms—how to handle doubt and how to cultivate a genuine life with God. Either could fill a book, so you will want to focus in on just a few issues tonight.

The Big Ideas

The big ideas from this chapter are:

- Having doubts is okay, so long as we ask our questions and push through to solid answers, because answers are available.
- We are attempting to separate the “goofy religious” from who Jesus really is.
- God loves the things you love, he put those things in your heart, and it is totally appropriate and wonderful to meet him in those things.

Questions for Discussion

Many young people feel backed into a corner: turn a blind eye to the stinking parts of religion out of loyalty to their church or a sincere desire to stay with God, or let the squat foul everything and reject faith altogether. (Killing Lions) Have you found yourself in that dilemma? What have you done with the doubts you have?

In the video Sam said, “We feel like faith has to be stained glass, or bowed heads, eyes closed; we feel like it has to be religious.” Have you ever felt like that?

If you could separate Jesus and his teachings from the wacky and harmful Christian cultures out there, how much of your doubts about faith would remain?

In looking for God, it is helpful to look in those things particular to your friendship with God—walking on the beach, reading a great book, listening to music, dinner and laughter with friends. What do you love to do? And have you connected God with your love of that?

When it comes to cultivating a life with God, talk about what works for you. Where do you find God? What helps you connect with him?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Nine; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



THE COLLISION OF INTIMACY

Read: Chapter Nine in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Nine – *Living with Courage*

Getting Ready

You'll notice this video doesn't completely line up with the chapter itself. Many groups will be diverse in their make-up: some will be groups of young married guys, others will be a group of single college buddies. The video will work for both groups, but some of the questions may not. Feel free to tailor the focus of your time together to match where your group is at.

The Big Ideas

Wherever you are in relationship to a woman, courage is always going to be one of the core issues; that's why the video is on courage.

The woman is here to call you out of yourself...to take you beyond yourself.

You cannot possibly hope to fill the abyss inside of Eve. Will that keep you from loving her?

Questions for Discussion

Sam said in the video, “It all comes down to courage... fear is what pins most men down... it keeps us from chasing our dreams, committing to a relationship...” Can you see that playing out in the guys you know?

The chapter is talking about men and women in the context of marriage, so maybe it would be good to stop and ask yourself, *What are my feelings toward marriage—and where did those come from?*

Think about the *Lover versus Consumer* idea—are you going to the woman to get something or give something? Talk about how that struck you. Which category do most of the guys you know fall into?

It’s not up to you to fill Eve. Where has that proven true for you? And what does it make you want to do?

What are your dreams for life with a woman? What is the relationship you are hoping for (regardless of whether you are single or married)?

If you want to live with courage, you have to start living with courage. What does that look like for you in relationships with women?

Close

Remind the guys when your next meeting is; to read Chapter Ten; and if you are doing the *Journal*, to dive into that before your next meeting. Ask somebody to close with a prayer.



RACING TOWARDS THE UNKNOWN

Read: Chapter Ten in *Killing Lions*

Watch: Film Ten – *The Man You Are Becoming*

Getting Ready

This is your last formal session together—at least, as far as this series goes. Give some thought this week to what you'd like to see happen from here. You may be done, you might even be relieved it's over! But for many men, this kind of experience stirs up a longing for more. Ask God if he'd have you continue on as a group together and become a "Band of Brothers." Maybe he has that for your whole group, maybe he will call just a few of you to become a band. Pray about it. Be prepared to bring this up with the group.

You might want to suggest: "Let's seek some adventure together—maybe take a wilderness trip or a short-term mission trip." Or "Let's do another series together" (See some options at the end of this guide). In any case, your group ought to at least talk about where you go from here at the close of your time together.

The Big Ideas

In their closing chapter of the book, Sam first looks back on some of the lions he has faced, and looks ahead to lions he knows are coming. He makes the choice to ask God to father him. This is the essence of the journey.

Questions for Discussion

What are some of the lions you've faced? (You might not even have thought of them as lions, but what fearful challenges have you had to overcome? Auditioning for a play for the first time? Moving to a new school? Giving a speech in class? Trying out for the team? Getting a job? Going on that weeklong back-packing trip?)

What are the lions you are facing now?

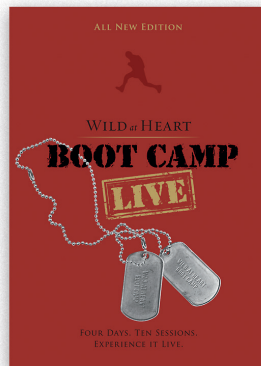
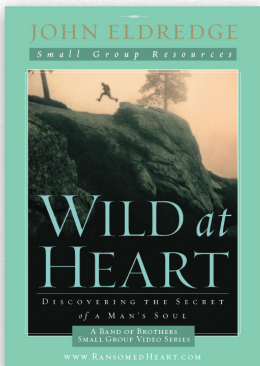
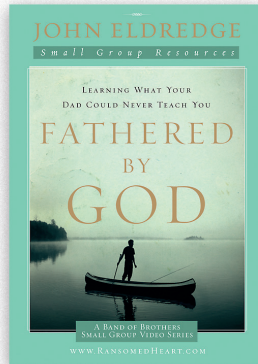
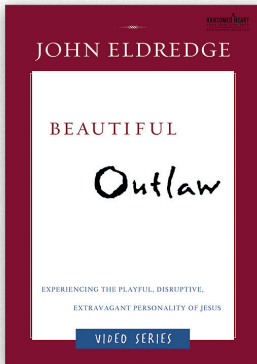
The video was all about who you are becoming. Do you like who you are becoming?

"There is no wasted time" is a Big Idea. In the video Sam said, "We are looking for God as Father; we are welcoming the process of becoming sons." This might be the simplest, most revolutionary step you can take. Will you ask God to father you? Really?
