 - 1. Absolute truth defined: "Absolute truth is that which is true for all people, in every situation, and for all of time. I must acknowledge that there are fundamental moral and ethical guidelines that exist independently of my own personal opinion. I acknowledge that the distinction between right and wrong is defined outside myself, it does not change from person to person, and it does not change from day to day."
 - Absolute truth defined: "Truth is defined by God for everyone, in every situation, for all of time. It is objective and absolute." God uses absolute truth to protect, provide and perfect me.
 - Tolerant truth defined: "Truth is defined by the individual. It is subjective and situational, largely governed by feelings rather than facts. Satan uses tolerant truth to deceive, divide, and destroy me."
 - 4. "Tolerance" by Webster: "Tolerance is to recognize and respect others' beliefs, practices, etc. without sharing them and to bear or put up with someone or something not especially liked."
 - Defining "new" tolerant truth: The definition of new tolerance is that "every individual's beliefs, values, lifestyle, and perception of truth claims are equal. There is no hierarchy of truth. Your beliefs and my beliefs are equal and all truth is relative. You must give your approval, your endorsement, your sincere support to the beliefs and behavior of others. All beliefs, values, and lifestyles are equal."
