•	Forgiveness is truly and exemplified in how God forgave sinners through Christ (Eph. 4:32; Col. 3:12-13).
•	What is forgiveness? Forgiveness is a decision to release (pardon) a person from the guilt of sin while moving forward with grace, mercy, and love.

Confession of Sin

(Prov. 28:13; Lk. 17:3-5).

• Confession of sin is acknowledging known sin before God and men that you have sinned against. It is the opposite of concealing (Prov. 28:13; Ps. 32:5).

7	-	of Forgiveness
	•	Forgiveness is first a matter of the heart. Before forgiveness can truly and successfully granted, one's heart must be in the right place.
	•	When forgiveness cannot be granted, there can still be a heart attitude of forgiveness (Lk. 23:33; Acts 7:58).
	•	A person who has a heart of forgiveness desires for a person to receive forgiveness than vengeance (Psalm 78:38, 86:5).
	•	The first coming of Christ was a display of mercy and grace to sinners, while the second coming will be a display of vengeance.
	•	An attitude of forgiveness is by understanding and living in light of the forgiveness you have received from God.
7	- G	ranting Forgiveness
	•	When a person repents and seeks forgiveness, it must be granted (Lk. 17:3-5; 1 Jn. 1:9).
	•	"There are times when someone asks for forgiveness, the offended party does not grant forgiveness. This is a form of vengeance. You are punishing them by withholding forgiveness. There is no good and godly reason to withhold forgiveness

- If you withhold forgiveness, this _____ something about yourself, and you need to examine your heart. You're not living as one who has been forgiven.
- Christ gave stern warnings for those who are unforgiving. If you do not forgive, God will not forgive you. (Matt. 6:14-15; Matt. 18:22-35; Mrk. 11:25)
- "It is certain, then, that Jesus does not condition the granting of forgiveness upon the behavior of the offender after forgiveness, but rather hangs the granting of forgiveness upon the brother's verbal testimony *alone*: 'and seven times in a day should return to you saying, 'I repent." It is the *saying*, not the subsequent *doing* on his part, that should activate the offended one to grant forgiveness." —Jay Adams

- He is the one who is offended, so he needs to come to me. I'm not going to him.
 - God ______ towards hostile sinners in sacrificial love for the sake of the relationship (Rom. 5:28; Matt. 5:23-24).
- If I approach her, she may respond to me in a hurtful way, so I should avoid any confrontation (Rom. 5:8; 1 Pet. 2:20-25; Heb. 12:2-3).
 - If God took this approach, your relationship with Him would have never been reconciled.
 - The message of the gospel is about the offended sacrificing for the offender to restore the relationship (Rom. 5:8).
 - There are times when you should avoid danger or harm (Prov. 22:3; Matt. 10:23; Acts 9:23-25; Acts 14:5-7). However, before you put up barriers, always consider what God sacrificed for His relationship with you (Phil. 2:3-8).
 - Gospel ministry involves dangerous risks. If emotional and physical safety is your number one _____ then you will pass on many gospel opportunities (Acts. 7:58-60; 2 Cor. 11:23-28; 1 Pet. 218-25).
