Victory Over Temptation

When we face temptation and spiritual battles, it's easy to feel defeated or discouraged. But understanding what's really happening in these moments can transform how we respond to challenges in our faith journey.

What Does It Mean When You're Struggling with Temptation?

Struggling with temptation doesn't mean you're failing spiritually. In fact, the very act of resisting temptation is evidence of what you truly want in your heart. Jesus himself was "tempted at all points, struggled, fought, resisted." It wasn't fun, but he did it and he won.

When you feel tempted, remember that the struggle itself proves what you really desire. If you didn't truly want Jesus, you wouldn't be fighting against sin at all. The very fact that you resist sin and "suffer in the flesh" while doing it demonstrates what's really in your heart.

How Do You Distinguish Between Temptation and Your True Identity?

One of the most important realizations is understanding that temptation is not who you are. In 1 John 2:15-16, we learn that "the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life is not of the Father, but is of the world." These temptations aren't coming from within you as a new creation in Christ—they're coming from without.

When you're born again, you have a new spirit. You're one with the Holy Spirit. The temptations you face are your opponent, not your identity. Like a boxer who knows his opponent is not himself, you need to recognize that the temptation you're fighting is external to your true identity in Christ.

What Can We Learn from Jesus About Overcoming Temptation?

Jesus provides the perfect example of how to overcome temptation. In the Garden of Gethsemane, facing the ultimate test, Jesus didn't just sit and suffer—he prayed. He expressed his heart to the Father, saying, "Nevertheless, not my will, but yours be done."

Through prayer, Jesus reminded himself of what he truly wanted above all the screaming voices of his flesh. He lifted his voice above all other voices to express his heart's true desire—to please the Father.

This is how we win too. When temptation comes, we need to remind ourselves what we really want. We need to express our love for God above all the other voices that try to convince us otherwise.

What Happens When We Give In to Temptation?

When we give in to temptation, we give "great occasion to the enemies of the Lord to blaspheme," as Nathan told David in 2 Samuel 12:14. The spiritual forces of darkness mock God when we fall.

But the good news is that even if we fall, we can get back up. As Micah 7:8 declares, "Do not rejoice over me, my enemy; when I fall, I will arise." We may be knocked down, but we're not knocked out.

How Has Jesus Freed Us from the Consequences of Sin?

Isaiah 51:22-23 gives us a powerful promise: "See, I have taken out of your hand the cup of trembling, the dregs of the cup of my fury. You shall no longer drink it."

Jesus drank the cup of God's judgment for us. He took all our curses upon himself. As Galatians 3:13 says, "Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law, having become a curse for us." Because of this, we don't have to bear the consequences of our sin when we repent.

Instead of us being under the enemy's feet, the enemy is under our feet. The victory is complete because Jesus has already triumphed over principalities and powers.

Life Application

This week, I challenge you to recognize the spiritual battle for what it is. When temptation comes, don't identify with it—identify with Christ in you. Remember that your struggle against sin proves your love for God.

When you feel overwhelmed by temptation:

- Remind yourself of what you truly want—Jesus above all else
- Pray like Jesus did, expressing your heart's true desire to please God
- · Remember that the enemy is under your feet, not the other way around
- If you fall, get back up immediately, knowing that Jesus has already paid for your sin

Ask yourself:

- Am I confusing my temptations with my identity?
- When tempted, do I remind myself of what I truly want?
- Do I recognize that my spiritual struggles actually prove my love for God?
- If I've fallen, am I staying down or getting back up?

Remember, in Christ, you're a fighter. And in Christ, you always triumph and always win. The enemy may knock you down, but in Jesus, you will arise.

- 1. "When you face temptation, you feel wrong—you don't feel righteous or like a good person. And if you're not careful, you'll mistake that feeling for who you are instead of what you're fighting. It's your opponent—it's not you."
- 2. "The very fact that you resist sin and suffer in the flesh while doing it is proof of what you truly want. You should be commended for a fight well fought—because you're fighting the fight of faith."
- 3. "Jesus resisted the temptation to rebel against God's plan, to give in to His flesh, to save His own life—resisting to the point of bursting blood vessels so that His sweat mingled with blood. It was an intense battle. He was tempted at every point, yet without sin. He struggled, fought, resisted. It wasn't fun, but He did it—and He won."
