Matthew 26:6–16, NLT - 6 Meanwhile, Jesus was in Bethany at the home of Simon, a man who had previously had leprosy. 7 While he was eating, a woman came in with a beautiful alabaster jar of expensive perfume and poured it over his head. 8 The disciples were indignant when they saw this. Thoughts of Remembrance

on this Memorial Day Weekend 2023

1. Thoughts about the Tomb and the soldiers that guard it.

The Tomb of the Unknowns (also known as the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier) in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C., where in 1921 we first laid an unknown soldier to rest. The site is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 day a year by specially trained members of the U.S. Army—specifically, the Third United States Infantry Regiment (also known as the "Old Guard"). There is incredible imagery that surrounds the Tomb.

2. The sentinels that guard the Tomb take an oath.

After memorizing word-for-word and being tested on a 17-page document on the history of the Tomb and Arlington National Cemetery, they take a brief "Remembrance Oath" that reads,

- 1. We will forever **mourn** the loss of the soldier(s) we guard.
- 2. We will forever **remember** the lives of the soldier(s) we guard.
- 3. We will forever be **thankful** for the lives of the soldier(s) we guard.

3. Notice the contrast between Mary and Judas in Matthew 26.

- 1. Mary is concerned about giving extravagantly to Jesus.
- 2. **Judas** is concerned about **getting** what he can from Jesus.
- 3. We are told to remember both.
