Escape from God's Presence

- Jonah's Attempt to Flee from God (vs. 3)
 - Because of His Feelings of Incapability
 - o To Live Up to God's Expectations
 - o To Understand God's Purpose
 - Because of His Fear and Incompetence
 - To Respond to God's Desires
 - o To Realize the Mind of Christ (Phil. 2:4-5)
- · Jonah's Attempt to be Free from God
 - Be Free from Accountability
 - o To the Word of God
 - To the People of God
 - Be Free from Responsibility
 - The Responsibility to Walk in Submission
 - $\circ \quad \text{ The Responsibility to Minister in Calling} \\$

Experience of Great Peril (vs 4)

- Jonah's Journey into the Place of Disobedience
 - The Personal Effects
 - Uncooperative Attitude: Ran from God and refused to call upon God (Vs. 2-3).
 - o Bitter Spirit: Trouble with authority brings bitterness and isolation.

- Self-Jeopardy: Jonah put his own life at risk!
- The Public Effects
 - Disruption of Family Life: Jonah not only left God but his family as well.
 - Deterioration of Health: Stress comes where there is no peace.
 - Depletion of Finances: His fare was not cheap (3,000 mile trip).
 - Damage to Others: The ship was in jeopardy along with others.
- Jonah's Journey into the Place of Discipline
 - The Course of this World
 - A Chartered Course Away from God
 - A Chartered Course toward Gloom
 - The Calamity of the Waves (James 1:6)
 - Winds of Conflict
 - Winds of Correction
 - The Center of the Whale
 - Jonah Entered the Belly of Hell
 - Jonah Exited as a Believer in Healing
