Who are the ger?

Lev 19:33-34

The word ger (here rendered "alien") occurs 92 times in the Hebrew Bible...and refers not to all foreigners, but only to one who has settled in the land for some time and has special legal status as a resident alien. Leviticus repeatedly commands that the *μ* be treated like the native born, even though he is still different. In this case, the command to "love him" is identical to the earlier command to love one's neighbor. – John J. Collins, "Love Your Neighbor: How it Became the Golden Rule"

How does God say to act toward the ger?

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Lev 19:34

This verse does not ground the command in ontology, in the creation of all human beings in the image of God. If it did, there would be no reason to distinguish between the ger and other kinds of foreigners. It is grounded in analogous experience and calls to mind the Golden Rule: one should treat others as one would wish to be treated oneself. – Collins How should one show love to citizens (and ger)?

We must take steps to replace our weakness with health



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

³³ "When an <u>alien</u> resides with you in your land, you must not oppress him. ³⁴ You will regard the <u>alien</u> who resides with you as the native-born among you. You are to love him as yourself, for you were <u>aliens</u> in the land of Egypt; I am the Lord [YHWH] your God."

Hebrew: גר ger = stranger; legal alien who chooses to live with Israel lawfully; ger could become a citizen

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The ger are exactly like my missionary friends in Milano. **They were legal** aliens, paying all the taxes demanded of **Italian citizens. They** owned property, put down roots, and spoke Italian.

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Only love the one who is much like you?





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Only love the one who is much like you?



Since the ger by definition is not an Israelite, kamokha [as yourself] here cannot have an adjectival force (the alien who is like you). The reason given for the command to love the alien is "for you were aliens in the land of Egypt," (Exod 22:20; 23:9; Deut 10:19; 23:8). Kamokha then here and in verse 18—is adverbial, which is to say that it clarifies how one should love. This verse does not ground the command in ontology, in the creation of all human beings in the image of God. If it did, there would be no reason to distinguish between the ger and other kinds of foreigners. It is grounded in analogous experience and calls to mind the Golden Rule: one should treat others as one would wish to be treated oneself. – John J. Collins, "Love Your Neighbor: How it Became the **Golden Rule**"

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Two great mistakes keep us from finding joy in loving strangers:

- Assume they must be like us in order to be loved.
- Pretend there is no difference between peoples.

And just how should one show the love to the fellow citizens?

⁹ When you reap the harvest of your land, you are not to reap to the very edge of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. ¹⁰ Do not strip your vineyard bare or gather its fallen grapes. Leave them for the poor and the resident alien; I am the LORD your God.

¹¹ Do not steal. Do not act deceptively or lie to one another.
 ¹² Do not swear falsely by my name, profaning the name of your God; I am the LORD.

¹³ Do not oppress your neighbor or rob him. The wages due a hired worker must not remain with you until morning.

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

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


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January 28, 1937 City Council meeting Lodz, Poland (city of 700,000)

Dr. Isaac Lewin, Councilman: [There are] terrible things happening on the streets of Lodz. [a 23 year-old Jew had been stabbed to death that day.] **Councilman Kowalski: Bravo, bravo!** "noise in the hall." Councilman Czernik: I am ready to kill hundreds of you in one hour. **Council President: Order. Order!**



January 28, 1937 City Council meeting Lodz, Poland (city of 700,000)

Councilman Lewin: The City Council should appeal to the citizens that peace be restored. The City Council should teach the population the lesson of peace and call upon all inhabitants to live in peace. **Councilman Schweidler: In Palestine, you can speak of peace! Councilman Lewin: We are proud of Palestine, and you do not** have the right to tell us what we should do in Palestine. **Councilman Kowalski [pounding his desk]: Go to Palestine!**

Is today's "Go to Poland" truly different from the "Go to Palestine" abusively hurled at my father? Czernik's sadistic 1937 dream of killing hundreds of Jews in one hour was realized with the Holocaust and repeated with the Oct. 7 massacre. But the sliver of land between the Jordan River and the Mediterranean Sea that my father's Jew-hating colleagues then called "Palestine" is very different today. Israel preserves the rights of all residents, whether or not they are Jewish, against vicious assaults. The embattled democracy seeks only—as my father urged—to live in peace. – Nathan Lewin, "Go Back to Poland"
