


Sometimes I worry. I worry about catching COVID-19. I worry about being able to meet payroll if sales fall. I worry about letting down Faithlife's employees, customers, and investors. 




<sup>30</sup> Immediately Jesus realized that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd and said,

Only believe." <sup>37</sup> He did not let anyone accompany him except Peter, James, and John, James's brother. <sup>38</sup> They came to the leader's house, and he saw a commotion—people weeping and wailing loudly. <sup>39</sup> He went in and said to them, "Why are you making a commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but asleep."






