


These two verses seem to encapsulate what Jesus meant by "abide." For the grape branch, attachment to the vine gives life and enables the natural production of fruit. The attachment is not glue or magnetic or mechanical adhesion, but interwoven, living connection. Life flows from the vine to the branches and the branches are made part of the life of the vine. Implied in this is utter, complete dependence on God working through Messiah Jesus. - Martin MacDonald
