

Bible Study Guide: Called to Freedom

Scripture: Galatians 5:13

"For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another." (ESV)

Theme

Freedom in Christ is a calling to love and serve.

Study Objective

To understand that Christian freedom is not permission to live selfishly but an invitation to love God and serve others. Through Christ, believers are set free from the power of sin and the burden of the law so they can live by the Holy Spirit in love and humility.

Background

In Galatians, Paul defends the truth that salvation comes through faith in Jesus Christ and not by keeping the Law of Moses. After explaining that believers have been set free through Christ, Paul addresses an important question: What should

believers do with this freedom? He teaches that Christian freedom is not a license to satisfy sinful desires but a responsibility to serve others in love. True freedom is expressed through a life that reflects Christ's selfless example.

Key Truth

Christ has set believers free so they can love, serve, and glorify God by caring for others rather than living for themselves.

Cross References

Galatians 5:1

"For freedom Christ has set us free..."

Truth: Christ has liberated believers from the bondage of legalism and sin.

John 8:36

"So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed."

Truth: Jesus gives true spiritual freedom.

Romans 6:18

Believers have been set free from sin and have become servants of righteousness.

Philippians 2:3–5

Christians are called to humility, considering others above themselves and following Christ's example.

Mark 10:45

Jesus came not to be served but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many.

Observation Questions

1. What have believers been called to according to this verse?
2. What warning does Paul give about freedom?
3. How should believers use their freedom?
4. What does it mean to serve one another through love?

Interpretation

Paul teaches that Christian freedom is not freedom to sin but freedom from sin's control and from trying to earn God's favor through the law. Believers are free to live according to God's purposes. Instead of

using freedom for selfish desires, Christians are called to imitate Christ by serving others with humility and love. The Holy Spirit empowers believers to live in this way, producing a life that honors God and blesses others.

Application

Ask yourself:

- Am I using my freedom to honor God or to satisfy my own desires?
- How can I serve others more intentionally?
- Does my life reflect Christ's humility and love?
- Are there selfish attitudes I need to surrender to God?

Practical applications:

- Look for opportunities to serve family, friends, and your church.
- Choose love over selfishness in your daily decisions.
- Use your gifts and abilities to encourage and help others.
- Depend on the Holy Spirit to overcome sinful desires.

- Remember that true freedom is found in following Christ.
