

## Sermon Study Guide

### Encouragement Through Partnership and Purpose

**Text:** Philippians 1:1-11

**Theme:** True encouragement points people toward Christ, strengthens their faith, and reminds them that God is still working in their lives.

---

#### Introduction

Paul's letter to the Philippians is one of the most personal and encouraging letters in Scripture. What makes this remarkable is that Paul wrote these words while imprisoned. Instead of focusing on his hardships, he focused on God's faithfulness and the growth of others.

Paul demonstrates that Christian encouragement is more than positive thinking—it is helping people see God's work, God's promises, and God's purpose in their lives.

#### Key Verse:

*"Being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus."* — Philippians 1:6

## **Point 1: Encouragement Begins With Gratitude**

### **Scripture**

Philippians 1:3-5

*"I thank my God every time I remember you."*

### **Teaching**

Paul starts with gratitude rather than criticism.

Many leaders begin with what needs fixing. Paul begins with appreciation.

Encouragement often starts by recognizing what God is doing in others rather than focusing on their shortcomings.

When people feel valued, they become more open to growth.

### **Biblical Example**

Paul expressed similar gratitude toward the Thessalonian believers.

1 Thessalonians 1:2-3

*"We always thank God for all of you..."*

## **Application**

- Express appreciation regularly.
- Thank people before correcting them.
- Celebrate faithfulness in others.

## **Point 2: Encouragement Reminds People God Is Still Working**

### **Scripture**

Philippians 1:6

*"He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion."*

### **Teaching**

Paul reminds believers that God finishes what He starts.

Many people become discouraged because they focus on how far they still have to go rather than how far God has already brought them.

Christian growth is a process.

God is not finished with us.

### **Biblical Example**

Peter denied Jesus three times but later became a powerful leader in the early church.

John 21:15-19

Jesus restored Peter and gave him purpose again.

### **Application**

- Don't define yourself by your failures.
- Trust God's ongoing work.
- Encourage others when they struggle.

### **Discussion Questions**

1. Why is it difficult to trust God's timing?
2. What area of your life is God still working on?
3. How does Philippians 1:6 give hope during failure?

4. Who needs to hear this promise today?

## **Point 3: Encouragement Comes Through Genuine Love**

### **Scripture**

Philippians 1:7-8

*"God can testify how I long for all of you with the affection of Christ Jesus."*

### **Teaching**

Paul's encouragement flowed from authentic love.

People can tell the difference between genuine care and empty compliments.

Christian encouragement should be rooted in Christ-like love.

### **Biblical Example**

Jesus consistently demonstrated compassion toward people.

Matthew 9:36

*"He had compassion on them..."*

## **Application**

- Listen before speaking.
- Care about people beyond their usefulness.
- Love people as Christ loves them.

4. How can we better show Christ's love to others?

## **Point 4: Encouragement Promotes Spiritual Growth**

### **Scripture**

Philippians 1:9-10

*"That your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight."*

## **Teaching**

Paul's prayer was not merely for comfort but for maturity.

True encouragement helps people become more like Christ.

Spiritual growth requires:

- Love
- Knowledge
- Discernment
- Obedience

Encouragement is helping people move forward in their walk with God.

## **Biblical Example**

Paul encouraged Timothy to continue growing.

2 Timothy 2:15

*"Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved."*

## **Application**

- Encourage growth, not just comfort.
- Pray for spiritual maturity.
- Help others pursue God's wisdom.

## **Discussion Questions**

1. What is the difference between comfort and growth?
2. Why is discernment important for believers?
3. How does God's Word help us grow?

## **Point 5: Encouragement Keeps Christ at the Center**

### **Scripture**

Philippians 1:11

*"Filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God."*

### **Teaching**

Paul's ultimate goal was not personal success but God's glory.

Encouragement should always point people toward Jesus.

When Christ remains the center:

- Joy remains steady.
- Hope remains alive.
- Purpose remains clear.

## **Biblical Example**

John the Baptist understood this principle.

John 3:30

*"He must become greater; I must become less."*

## **Application**

- Give God credit for growth.
- Point people to Jesus, not yourself.
- Live for God's glory.

## **Discussion Questions**

1. Why is it easy to make life about ourselves?
2. How can we keep Christ at the center?
3. What fruit of righteousness should be evident in believers?

4. How does living for God's glory change our perspective?
