

Marks of Godly Leadership

Scripture: Genesis 45:4–15 (NASB 95)

Introduction

Leadership is not reserved for a select few, it is revealed in all. Every life leaves a mark, shaping those around us in the home, the workplace, and the church. The question is not whether we lead, but how we lead. Genesis 45 places Joseph in a defining moment. Face to face with the very men who betrayed him, his response reveals what has been formed in him. Instead of bitterness or revenge, we see the marks of godly leadership on full display.

Main Points

1. Tender C_____ — A Heart That Draws Near

- **Key Scripture:** Genesis 45:4
 - Joseph responds to fear with tenderness rather than retaliation.
 - He removes distance and draws his brothers near.
 - Godly leadership moves toward people in their weakness instead of withdrawing from them.
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2. Doctrinal C_____ — A Mind Grounded in Truth

- **Key Scripture:** Genesis 45:5–8
 - Joseph acknowledges their sin but interprets it through the sovereignty of God.
 - He helps them understand that God was at work even through their wrongdoing.
 - Right thinking, shaped by truth, leads to right living.
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3. Restorative C_____ — A Life That Moves to Action

- **Key Scripture:** Genesis 45:9–15
 - Joseph not only forgives his brothers, he provides for them and restores them.
 - His compassion is active, intentional, and forward-moving.
 - True restoration flows from a heart changed by God and a mind grounded in truth.
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Application

For Unbelievers:

Christ does not merely show care, He restores. Through His life, death, and resurrection, He reconciles sinners to God. Come to Him and receive forgiveness and new life.

For Believers:

Examine your life. Are you leading with tender care, doctrinal clarity, and restorative compassion? Let your leadership reflect the work God has done in you.
