

## 5-Day Devotional: Responding to our Divine Purpose

**Day 1: Called According to His Purpose** **Reading: Romans 8:28-30** **Devotional:** Before the foundation of the world, God knew you and set His affection upon you. The call to salvation is not random—it is purposeful and intentional. God foreknew you, predestined you, and called you to be conformed to the image of His Son. This means your life has divine purpose beyond what you can see. Today, reflect on this truth: you didn't stumble into God's family by accident. He drew you to Himself because He desires relationship with you. When circumstances seem chaotic, remember that God is working all things together for your good according to His purpose. Your transformation into Christ's likeness is His ultimate goal. **Reflection Question:** How does knowing God specifically called you change the way you view your current circumstances?

**Day 2: The Journey of Holiness** **Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4:1-8** **Devotional:** Sanctification is God's will for your life—the ongoing process of becoming holy and set apart. Unlike justification, which happens in a moment, sanctification is a lifelong journey. You were washed, sanctified, and justified in Christ's name, but now you must walk out that reality daily. This means making conscious choices to abstain from sin and pursue godliness. Martin Luther discovered that righteousness is not earned through religious rituals or good works, but received through faith. However, genuine faith produces transformed living. You are being saved from the power of sin daily as you yield to the Holy Spirit's work within you. Holiness is not about perfection but about progressive surrender.

**Reflection Question:** What area of your life is God calling you to surrender today in your sanctification journey?

**Day 3: Living by Faith Alone** **Reading: Habakkuk 2:4; Romans 1:16-17** **Devotional:** "The righteous will live by faith"—this revelation transformed Martin Luther and sparked the Reformation. Many believers still struggle with performance-based Christianity, trying to earn God's approval through religious activity. But salvation is entirely God's work, a gift of grace received through faith alone. You cannot climb spiritual stairs to reach God; Christ descended to reach you. Righteousness is not something you achieve but something Christ imparts to you. When you feel spiritually inadequate, remember that your standing before God depends on Christ's righteousness, not your own. Faith is trusting completely in what Jesus accomplished on the cross. This liberating truth should fill you with gratitude and rest, not anxiety and striving. **Reflection Question:** In what ways are you still trying to earn God's acceptance rather than resting in Christ's finished work?

**Day 4: Equipped and Called to Serve** **Reading: Ephesians 2:8-10; John 15:16** **Devotional:** You were saved by grace for a purpose—good works that God prepared in advance for you. Christ chose you and appointed you to bear fruit that remains. This is the call to service. God has equipped you with spiritual gifts not for personal consumption but for building up His kingdom. Your life is His workmanship, a masterpiece created to display His glory through acts of love and service. You are not saved by works, but you are saved for works. The same grace that rescued you now empowers you to serve others. Don't minimize your calling or compare your gifts to others. Whatever God has placed in your hands is significant in His economy. Step into the service He's prepared for you.

**Reflection Question:** What spiritual gifts has God given you, and how are you currently using them to serve others?

**Day 5: Living as Children of God** **Reading: 1 John 3:1-3; 2 Corinthians 6:14-18** **Devotional:** Behold what manner of love the Father has given us—that we should be called children of God! This is the call to sonship, the most intimate of all God's calls. You are not merely a servant or subject; you are a beloved son or daughter. This identity requires separation from worldly entanglements that compromise your witness and hinder your relationship with the Father. As God's child, you carry His DNA and represent His family. The hope of seeing Christ and becoming fully like Him should purify your life today. You are already His child, but the fullness of what you will become has not yet been revealed. Live in the tension of this "already but not yet" reality—fully embraced by the Father while eagerly anticipating complete transformation when you see Him face to face. **Reflection Question:** How does your identity as God's child influence your daily decisions and relationships?
