



IRON DOESN'T SHARPEN IN SILENCE



“As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another.” — Proverbs 27:17

Most men say they want accountability—until accountability actually shows up.

Because accountability isn't comfortable. It's not polite. It's not always encouraging.

Sometimes it confronts you.

Sometimes it corrects you.

Sometimes it exposes what you'd rather ignore.

And that's exactly why it matters.

We live in a culture where men surround themselves with people who won't challenge them.

Guys who laugh off compromise. Who stay quiet when they should speak. Who choose comfort over truth.

That's not brotherhood—that's a slow collapse.

Real sharpening requires friction. When iron sharpens iron, it's not gentle. It's force against force. It creates heat. It removes dullness. And if you're honest, sometimes it stings.

But that's where growth happens.

You don't grow when everyone agrees with you.

You don't grow when no one questions you.

You don't grow when your blind spots stay hidden.

You grow when another man steps in and says:

- "That's not aligned with who you say you want to be."
- "You're making excuses."
- "Let's deal with this now—not later."

And here's the real test—not whether you have men like that around you... but whether you **listen when they speak**.

Pride resists accountability.

Humility embraces it.

If your first reaction to correction is defensiveness, you're missing the gift. Because accountability isn't about tearing you down—it's about building you up into the man God called you to be.

But this goes both ways.

You're not just called to receive sharpening—you're called to give it. That means having the courage to speak truth into another man's life, even when it's uncomfortable. Even when it risks tension.

Because silence doesn't protect your brother—it abandons him.

Reflection Questions:

- Do you have men in your life who challenge you—or just support you?
- How do you respond when someone corrects you?
- Where might you be avoiding hard conversations with others?

Challenge:

This week, invite real accountability. Ask a trusted brother to speak honestly into your life—and commit to receiving it without defensiveness. Then, be willing to do the same for him.

Lord, strip away my pride. Teach me to welcome correction instead of resisting it. Put men in my life who will sharpen me—and give me the courage to sharpen ot
