



FIRST IN, LAST OUT



“Bear one another’s burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ.” — Galatians 6:2

It’s easy to want brotherhood.
It’s harder to **be** a brother.

Most men are waiting. Waiting for someone to reach out. Waiting for someone to check in.
Waiting for someone to notice when they’re struggling.

But strong brotherhood doesn’t grow in waiting—it grows in **initiative**.

“First in, last out” isn’t just a mindset—it’s a commitment.

Because God builds strength in men who show up for others.

Reflection Questions:

Challenge:

Pick one man this week. Reach out. Check in. Pray with him. Follow up later in the week. Be consistent—not just once, but ongoing.

Jesus, make me a man who shows up. Not just when it's easy—but when it matters. Help me carry the burdens of my brothers and lead in building real, lasting brotherhood. Amen.
