



Day 5. Context: The Key to Understanding

Know it!

"For God is not a God of confusion but of peace." — 1 Corinthians 14:33

Context is one of the most important principles for understanding Scripture. Many alleged contradictions arise when verses are taken out of context. For example, someone might claim that the Bible is inconsistent because John 3:16 says, "For God so loved," while Deuteronomy 16:22 says, "The Lord your God hates." However, when we look at the full context, we see that John 3:16 refers to God's love for humanity, while Deuteronomy 16:22 speaks about God's hatred for idolatrous pillars.

Misquoting or misunderstanding Scripture can lead to confusion and misinterpretation. The Bible does not contradict itself; rather, it presents a unified truth that requires careful reading. Before making assumptions, we should always examine the surrounding verses and the overall message of Scripture.

- **Reflection:** When you encounter a difficult verse, do you take the time to investigate its context and consider different perspectives? Do you let isolated verses lead you into confusion, or do you seek a comprehensive understanding of God's Word?
