Chapters 1-5 – Introduction of God's indictment against Israel's past

God's Past Instructions

For Israel's Kings (Deuteronomy 17:14-20)

- 1. <u>Appointed</u> by God
- 2. Not to amass military power
- 3. Not to acquire wives
- 4. Not to accumulate large quantities of wealth
- 5. Was to abide in God's Word every day

The Promise for a King Who Trusted God

 Humble heart, uncompromised obedience, and an honorable <u>heritage</u>

DISTRUST LEADS TO DESOLATION

Distrust - to doubt; to suspect not to be real, true, sincere, or firm.

1. Distrust in God is <u>conceived</u> from forgetfulness (Deuteronomy 8:11-20)

God's warning during the time of Moses -

Forgetting what God declared in the past, blinds people from believing by faith what God declares for the future.

2. Distrust in God <u>creates</u> self-destructive securities (vv 1-3) "Note this" -

Judah's securities -

Deuteronomy 18:10:12 -

3. Distrust in God <u>corrupts</u> leadership (vv 4-12) Sign of a decaying nation - the decay of the family

Distrust in God is rebellion against God

"like Sodom" - flaunt their sin

4. Rebellion against God <u>carves</u> destructive paths (vv 3:13-4:1) Leaders' pride - <u>devastated</u> society's care (vv 13-15)

Womens' pride - disgraced their God designed beauty (vv 16-4:1)
