Never Ashamed

“Yea, let none that wait on thee be ashamed: let them be ashamed which transgress without cause.”—**Psalm 25:3**

“Let the proud be ashamed; for they dealt perversely with me without a cause: but I will meditate in thy precepts.”—**Psalm 119:78**

Both verses draw a sharp contrast between those who wait on the Lord and those who act proudly without cause. God promises that waiting faith will never end in shame, even when the righteous are misunderstood, falsely accused, or mistreated.

Shame belongs not to the patient believer, but to the proud who move ahead of God, speak without truth, or wound without reason.

Waiting on the Lord is not weakness—it is quiet confidence that God will vindicate in His time. Instead of reacting in pride, the Godly soul responds by meditating in God's Word and trusting God to set things right.

Joseph (**Genesis 37–50**).

Joseph was dealt with “without a cause.” Betrayed by his brothers. Falsely accused by Potiphar's wife. Forgotten in prison. Yet Joseph waited on the Lord, refusing bitterness and trusting God's purposes.

In time, God removed his shame and exalted him, while those who acted proudly were brought low. Waiting faith was vindicated. “Let none that wait on thee be ashamed...” — and Joseph never was.

Jesus Christ (**Matthew 26–27; 1 Peter 2:23**).

Jesus suffered more than any man without a cause. False witnesses - Mockery and rejection - yet He remained silent before His accusers. Instead of defending Himself in pride, He committed Himself to the Father and fulfilled Scripture. The cross looked like shame—but resurrection proved it was glory. Those who mocked Him were ashamed; the Waiting Son was exalted.

Waiting may look like loss—but it ends in honor. Silence before God is better than reaction in pride.

Meditation in God’s Word steadies the heart when injustice presses in. Waiting faith is never wasted—and never ashamed.
