The Battle and The Lord

“The LORD shall fight for you, and ye shall hold your peace.”—

Exodus 14:14

“They fought from heaven; the stars in their courses fought against Sisera.” —**Judges 5:20**

God does not only give His people commands — He gives them His own intervention.

At the Red Sea, Israel could not fight, run, or reason their way out — so God fought for them. In the days of Deborah, Israel did fight — but even then, heaven itself joined the battle.

Whether you are standing still or stepping forward, the victory always belongs to the LORD. God fights when His people cannot — and God fights when His people obey.

Jehoshaphat (**2 Chronicles 20**).

When Judah was surrounded by three armies, Jehoshaphat prayed instead of panicking. “For we have no might... neither know we what to do: but our eyes are upon thee.” (**2 Chr. 20:12**) God told them to stand still, just like Israel at the Red Sea. “Ye shall not need to fight in this battle... stand ye still, and see the salvation of the LORD.” (**2 Chr. 20:17**) As they worshiped, God sent confusion among the enemy, and the enemy destroyed themselves.

When God fights, praise replaces panic and victory comes without human strength.

Peter in Prison (**Acts 12:5–11**).

Peter was chained between soldiers, guarded by sixteen men. He could not fight. He could not escape. But the church prayed — and heaven moved. An angel entered the prison, chains fell off, gates opened, and Peter walked free.

“Now I know of a surety, that the Lord hath sent his angel, and hath delivered me.” (**Acts 12:11**).

When God fights for you, no prison, no power, no plan of man can stop Him.

Some battles require you to be still (**Exodus 14:14**). Some battles require you to step forward in faith (**Judges 5:20**). But every battle requires you to trust the Lord.

If God is fighting for you, you do not have to fight in fear.
