



## Do You See What I See? - Luke 22:63-71

1. Has there ever been a time in your life when you were falsely accused of something? How did you respond? As we look at Jesus, we continue to see that his response was truthful and yet nonretaliatory. How can we be more like Christ when we are falsely accused?
2. Charles Spurgeon said, "We need to lay aside our indignation and bring forth penitence because we all have hit our dear Savior in the face with our sin. It was because of our sin that He endured the abuse of these sinners and went willingly to the cross." What role did we play in the murder of Jesus?
3. The High Priest and other Sanhedrin members had a pre-trial during the cover of night to indict Jesus before an actual "legal" trial. These religious elites skirted their own rules to go after Jesus. Their ends justified their means. In what area(s) of your life are you prone to avoid the rules, bend the truth, or sacrifice integrity, to fit your ends or fleshly desires?
4. In the end, some people don't want the truth. Some would rather be blissfully ignorant rather than face the reality of sin. The reason for this is found in John 3:19. And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. In what ways do you see the world's love for darkness?
5. In the end, we find that people see what they want to see. If people are genuine seekers of truth, they will find it. Matthew 7:7 says, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. In what ways do you seek after truth?"
6. Sometimes, we wrongly use the word of God to focus on others instead of ourselves. How should we use the Word of God as a mirror? In what ways can we misuse it like binoculars?
