## **Discussion Questions:**

- Jesus refers to himself as the good shepherd. In other words, he is the messiah for us all.
  - Read Ezekiel 34:15, 22-24. As you compare the passages from John and Ezekiel, what similarities stand out to you?
  - O What depth do you feel as you read through John 10:11-18?
- The Greek word for "good" used in this passage is kalos meaning to be inspired passionately and beautifully.
  - If you are familiar with this passage, does it any of it feel watered-down? If so, why?
  - When reading scripture feels less than "kalos," how can renew its depth to you?
- Jesus knew the cross was coming. Nick made a profound statement saying, "Jesus didn't
  die so that God could change His mind about us. Jesus died so that we could change our
  minds about God." Jesus said, "you've heard this from me- now go."
  - We've heard the gospel, so how you do you go out to your community to share the love and truth of Jesus?
  - When you share the gospel, do you share it with kalos love and passion?
  - While we must love each other through social distancing, what are some unique ways to share the beautiful news of a beautiful shepherd?
    - Examples: bringing neighbors food, checking in with friends and family and sending them encouragement.
