V8

Finally,

Peter has concluded this section in which he encouraged Christians to display their freedom in submission for Christ's sake, as citizens, servants, wives and husbands.

all of you provides a transition from the preceding specific instructions to a list of godly virtues that all believers are called to exemplify at all times.

Peter concludes this section of his letter (started in 1 Peter 2:11) by addressing the entire Christian community

He calls for a "unity of mind" or common purpose among believers (Romans 15:5-7; 1 Corinthians 1:10; 2 Corinthians 13:11; Philippians 2:1-2). Peter is encouraging us to share the same spiritual values, proclaim the same gospel and to share the same passion and devotion for our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Prayerfully waiting for the coming of Jesus and serving one another in fervent love.

Our unity is only in the gospel of the cross

Harmony of attitude as well as of understanding.

The second thing he calls us to do is to have "sympathy". This has a sense of having a sensitivity to the needs, feelings and emotions of others. Rejoice with those who rejoice, mourn with those who mourn.

The third thing is "brotherly love" (this has come up earlier in 1 Peter 1:22). This is not the same as comradery in a football team, but deep love as a family whatever happens

The fourth thing is a "tender heart" for one another. We should be compassionate, quick to forgive and bear no malice towards each other.

Jesus was compassionate towards the crowds.

We have received free compassion, we must give freely

Finally he calls on us to have a "humble mind". We shouldn't think more highly of ourselves than we ought to (Philippians 2:3 in Humility count others more significant than yourselves)

All a work of grace in our lives

v9

Those who bless others will receive a blessing from God, which Peter explains in the following verses. The call for non-retaliation in verse 9 reminds us of how Jesus responded to those who reviled Him (1 Peter 2:23). Rather than retaliate, our response should be to bless.

We are called to bless (in response to cursing (Gen 12)



We bless that we may receive God's blessing
That we inherit a blessing
This not earning a blessing, but inheriting by grace a blessing

10-12 uses Psalm 34:12-16

#### V10a

A good day in a beer commercial shows friends drinking in the sunset at a fishing lodge A good day in the book of acts shows Paul and Silas in prison, their backs bleeding and feet in stocks singing psalms and preaching the gospel

Jesus said, whoever wants to save his life will lose, but whoever loses his life for me and the gospel will save it.

V10b-11 What does Peter say to receive life and good days?

The capacity to love life and see or enjoy good days depends on our commitment not to speak evil or speak deceitfully.

We cannot speak ill of others and expect to also enjoy the blessings of God. We shouldn't use the same mouths we use to praise and worship God to verbally abuse others. We need to tame our tongues! (see James 3:1-12). Having come to God through Christ we must turn away from evil and do good. Christ has redeemed us and we are filled with the Spirit, but there is still a need for intentionality on our part.

#### V12

Obedience to God in daily life is the path to experiencing God's blessing (cf. Ps. 34:4–10), and by implication disobedience will lead to God's discipline (cf. Ps. 34:16, 21; Heb. 12:4–11). Peter continues his quotation of Psalm 34: For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous (to observe and care for them) and his ears are open to their prayer (for various needs and cares). This does not mean that God keeps obedient believers from suffering (cf. 1 Pet. 2:19–23; 3:14, 17; 4:12–19) but that God will provide his grace "to strengthen and establish" believers in the midst of suffering (5:10) and in times of great need (cf. 2 Cor. 12:9; Heb. 4:16).

God's eyes are on the righteous and His ears are open to their prayers and He turns against those who do evil. As in 1 Peter 3:7, Peter ties prayer to obedience to God.
