- 1. Read 1 Corinthians 13:1-7. Understanding that these verses are the heart of a <u>rebuke</u> that begins in chapter 12 and goes through chapter 14, what is Paul rebuking the Corinthian church for?
- 2. How can Paul say that Christians can use their spiritual gifts in the church and still be spiritual "nothings."?
- 3. Explain the assertion: What *I do* reveals who I love. Give some examples of what this looks like in your life.
- 4. Read 1 Corinthians 13:4-7. What is Paul comparing and contrasting in these verses? How does this connect with his rebuke of the Corinthian church? How does this apply to our relationships, particularly marriage?
- 5. Discuss why "self-love" looks externally for change. Who are people you believe need to change to make your life better?
- 6. Why does self-love lead to impatience? What is the primary focus of self-loving people?
- 7. Why do self-loving people believe "they deserve" to be served? When do you feel like you deserve other people to serve you?
- 8. Paul's word "rude" means to do what I do without caring about how it affects you. When do you feel likes it's OK to be rude?
- 9. Why do self-loving people "keep score"? What does that do for them? Why is score keeping so destructive?
- 10. Explain how Jesus is the ultimate expression of God's love, and the opposite of the specific ways Paul describes self-love.
- 11. How would it change your marriage, or any other key relationship in your life, if you lived believing that everything you do is a response to Jesus? What would change about you if you decided to love God most... even more than yourself?
