Sermon Discussion Questions: "A Living Hope"

A People of Hope: 1 Peter 1:1-7

• Ice Breakers:

- Where were you when you found out about the events of 9/11?
- What other historical events have shaped our culture's sense of hope or hopelessness?

• Vision: A People of Hope

- We recently cast a vision to be a People of Hope. How did that vision strike you when you first heard it?
- o What role do you believe God is asking you to play in that vision?

• Read 1 Peter 1:1-7

- o Briefly summarize what Peter is saying in this passage.
- What is the context of this letter (*specifically cite v 6- trials and suffering*).
- In verses 3-5 note the use and importance of the prepositions (*i.e.* through, to, by). How do these prepositions help us understand the nature of hope Peter is describing?

• Defining Hope

- o Culturally how do people typically use the word hope?
 - Is there a greater sense of *uncertainty* or *confidence* in the word hope?
- How does what we believe about the future shape whether we are "hopeful" or "hopeless"?
 - Do you believe more people are hopeful or hopeless? How is that shaping our culture as a whole?

• Assign different people to read the following texts from Hebrews:

- Hebrews 11:1
- Hebrews 3:6
- Hebrews 6:11
- Hebrews 10:23
- How do these passages describe biblical hope

• Re-read 1 Peter 1:3-4

- How does Peter describe the inheritance for those born again to a living hope?
 - Is there a greater sense of *uncertainty* or *confidence* in living hope?
- What role does the resurrection play in offering hope to the hopeless?
- If living hope is defined as a life-shaping certainty, how does that impact our every day lives?

• Application & Reflection

- Which of the gospel identities (citizen, family, missionary) does this message most intersect with most?
- How must you trade a cultural understanding of hope for living hope?
- What does it practically look like to live as a person of hope:
 - In your neighborhood?
 - In your school or office?
 - In the places you play or interact with others?
