

Summary

In this Father's Day sermon, the pastor explores what it means to be a true man of God by contrasting fallen men, men of the world, and men of God. Drawing from 1 Timothy 6:11-12, he walks through how sin has deceived, defiled, destroyed, and separated mankind from God, and how only faith in Jesus Christ can restore that broken relationship. He challenges men to stop pursuing the empty promises of the world and instead pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. The pastor also calls men to fight three battles: against the flesh, against the enemy, and for the faith. Using passages from Ephesians 6 and 2 Timothy 4, he urges men to put on the full armor of God, discipline their bodies, and never let down their guard. The goal is not to accumulate the things of this world but to lay hold of eternal life and fulfill the assignment God has placed on each man's life, whether at home, at work, at church, or in the community.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, thank You for bringing us together today. As we open Your Word and discuss what it means to be men and women of God, we ask that You would quiet our hearts and remove any distractions. Holy Spirit, be our teacher. Open our eyes to see, our ears to hear, and our hearts to receive whatever You have for each of us today. May this time together not just be a conversation, but a moment of genuine transformation. In Jesus' name, amen.

Ice Breaker

Who is a man in your life, whether a Father, mentor, coach, or friend, who modeled godly character for you, and what is one thing you remember about Him?

Questions

- The pastor described fallen man as deceived, defiled, destroyed, and dead to God because of sin. Which of these four effects of sin do you think is most overlooked in our culture today, and why?
- In 1 John 2:15-17 (ESV), John warns against the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life. Can you think of a modern example of each one that men or women commonly face?
- The pastor said, 'You have the right to do whatever you want, but you do not have the freedom to choose the consequences.' How does this truth change the way you think about the decisions you are currently facing?
- The sermon challenged men to flee certain things and pursue others, including righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Which of these six qualities feels most difficult for you to pursue right now, and what makes it hard?
- The pastor said that prayer does not inform God of your need but rather declares that God is your source. How does that perspective shift the way you approach prayer in your daily life?
- Ephesians 6:10-12 (ESV) reminds us that our real battle is not against flesh and blood but against spiritual forces. How does recognizing the spiritual enemy behind your struggles change the way you respond to conflict or hardship?
- The pastor warned that many people run a good race for most of their life but let down their guard when they think they have arrived. What are some practical ways we can stay spiritually alert and keep fighting until the very end?
- Paul declared in 2 Timothy 4:7 (ESV), 'I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.' If you were to evaluate your life right now, which of those three statements feels most challenging to be able to say, and what would it take to get there?

Life Application

This week, choose one of the six qualities from 1 Timothy 6:11 (ESV), whether righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, or gentleness, and intentionally pursue it in one specific relationship or situation. Write it down, pray over it each morning, and at the end of the week reflect on how actively pursuing that quality changed your actions and your heart.

- Sin has left every person deceived, defiled, destroyed, and separated from God, but faith in Jesus Christ is the only path to restoration and wholeness.
- A man of God is called to flee the traps of this world and actively pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, and gentleness as a way of life.
