



Harvest Time: Souvenirs

This discipleship study draws directly from your reflection on the tension between self-centered achievements and humble submission to Christ, examining what we are truly carrying from this life into eternity.

This study centers on the concept of earthly **souvenirs**—the titles, achievements, possessions, and self-justifications we hoard to establish our identity and worth. While God blesses His children and places them as laborers in His harvest, humanity constantly battles the temptation to claim ownership of the vineyard. Scripture reminds us that we enter eternity carrying nothing from this world except the eternal, implanted Word of God living within us. When we hoard our successes on a shelf out of pride, we stand opposed to God. True discipleship requires releasing our grip on worldly souvenirs, throwing our crowns before the throne of Christ, and anchoring our entire life in His Word.

Discipleship Discussion Questions

1. **Understanding Identity:** Looking at the list of who we are (God's masterpiece, co-heirs) versus who we are not (God Himself, owners of the vineyard), which of these truths is hardest for our culture—or your own heart—to accept?
2. **The Vineyard Mindset:** In what ways do Christians unintentionally act like the "owners of the field" rather than faithful laborers working for the Master?
3. **Recognizing False Souvenirs:** What are the subtle "souvenirs" (status, accolades, moral self-reliance) you find yourself tempted to place on a shelf to claim as your own doing?
4. **Dissatisfaction & Desire:** The reflection notes that we often want "the cake and to eat it too." How does secret dissatisfaction with God's provision open the door to compromises disguised with good justifications?
5. **Casting Crowns:** Revelation and Scripture speak of casting our crowns at Christ's feet. What does it look like in your daily routine—at work, home, or ministry—to throw your successes back down at His feet right now?
6. **The Rich Young Ruler:** In Matthew 19:16–30, possessions kept a promising seeker from following Jesus. What current comfort or possession would be the hardest for you to walk away from if Christ called you to leave it?
7. **The Enduring Souvenir:** Why is the implanted Word of God (James 1:21–25) the only possession that outlasts this earthly life?

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8. **Hearing vs. Doing:** James warns against being mere hearers of the Word who look in a mirror and immediately forget what they look like. Where is there currently a gap between what you *know* of Scripture and how you *live*?
9. **The Deception of Self-Governance:** Why is it dangerous to think we have any control or influence over our fate apart from Christ, especially regarding eternity and judgment?
10. **Releasing the Grip:** What specific "souvenir" or personal plan do you need to actively surrender to Jesus this week so you can walk in total freedom and obedience?

Conclusion

True discipleship is an ongoing posture of open hands. The harvest field belongs entirely to God, and the work He entrusts to us is meant to bring Him glory, not build our personal display case. Clinging to the accolades and comforts of this passing world only fosters pride and blinds us to eternity. When we realize that Christ alone is our provider, redeemer, and reward, we are freed from the exhausting race to claim souvenirs for ourselves. By treasuring His eternal Word above all earthly praise, we learn the joyful posture of heaven: living fully for His kingdom and eagerly casting every crown back at the Master's feet.
