# Part 1: What components are an essential part to effective communication?

**College Speech 101:** The effect speaker is someone whose: character, knowledge, and judgment command respect.

- Component 1: Character
  - Your personal life cannot be disconnected from the message.
    - The roadblock:

- Component 2: Knowledge Base
  - You cannot teach what you do not know.
    - Teachers must be learners.
    - They need to be knowledgeable in the field they are addressing.
    - They need to be aware of the current discussions in the field they are addressing.

- Component 3: Ability to communicate in an engaging way
  - $\circ\hspace{0.4cm}$  The way you present concepts will be an asset or a liability.

    - **Simple yet sound logic:** Get them to think with you by asking good questions that lead them to good answers.
      - Some potential common fallacies to avoid in our teaching:
        - The red herring: a diversion tactic used to distract from the original question or argument.
        - The post hoc fallacy: A faulty cause and effect argument.
        - The straw man: Creating a mischaracterization that can be easily attacked.
        - Asking a loaded question: Asking a question that begins with an unsubstantiated assumption.

# Part 2: How do these components interrelate with God's instruction in the church?

- A warning to the church: James 3:1-2
- A standard in the church: 1 Timothy 3:1-6
  - **Character:** This is the overwhelming focus of these expectations.
  - **Knowledge:** "Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil..."
  - Ability to teach: "Apt to teach..."

# Part 3: What is the pattern God has established for the strength and future of the church? 2 Timothy 2:1-2

- **Teaching:** "The things thou hast heard..."
- A sense of responsibility: "Commit..."
- **Leadership Development:** "To faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also..."

## Part 4: Some concluding thoughts:

- Churches need to personally feel the weight of equipping the next generation of leaders.
- We cannot depend on seminaries and Bible colleges to do the work for us.
- Seminaries and Bible Colleges are ultimately downstream from the church.
- We need to emphasize character first and pattern godly character before the next generation.
- We need to do a better job expanding the knowledge base of the average church member.
- We also need to start earlier.
- We need to actively work to cultivate an environment where our young people will develop the skills to become excellent communicators with strong Biblical conviction.
