¹³ Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether it be to the emperor as supreme, 14 or to governors as sent by him to punish those who do evil and to praise those who do good. 15 For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people.16 Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. ¹⁷ Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor.



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"What happens when people fool themselves into believing that it's possible to separate our politics from our religion? For starters, you create the illusion of a public square that's religiously neutral, or at least partially neutral. But what you really have is a square rigged against organized religion. Organized religions are kept out. Unnamed idols are let in. Imagine an airport security metal detector that doesn't screen for metal but for religion standing at the entrance of the public square. The machine beeps anytime someone walks through it with a supernatural big-G God hiding inside one of their convictions, but it fails to pick up self-manufactured or socially constructed little-g gods. Into this public square the secularist, the materialist, the Darwinist, the consumerist, the elitist, the chauvinist, and, frankly, the fascist can all enter carrying their gods with them like whittled wooden figures in their pockets. Not so for the Christians or Jews or Muslims. Should they enter and make a claim on behalf of their big-G God, the siren will sound like a firetruck. What this means is that the public square is inevitably slanted toward the secularist and materialist. Public conversation is ideologically rigged."

Governments should write legislation drawing from the collective wisdom of common grace and the Bible.

"Proverbs 10:4 NIV reads, "Lazy hands make for poverty, but diligent hands bring wealth." A wise ruler, no doubt, will look for ways to maximize industry and not reward laziness. Certainly this has implications for welfare policies. How easy it is for a nation's welfare policies to abet laziness and so exacerbate poverty. However, Proverbs 29:7 reads, "A righteous man knows the right of the poor." And 29:14 says, "If a king faithfully judges the poor, his throne will be established forever." A good king, like a good shepherd, doesn't leave some of the sheep behind. He seeks to bless and benefit all. He is going to judge them and their circumstances with fairness. He is going to consider the causes of poverty and ask what might contribute to entrenched cycles of poverty. Wisdom, then, is figuring out how to put these last two points together, and that might change from circumstance to circumstance."
