



Matthew 6:22-23

[22] "The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, [23] but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness! (ESV)

"The evil eye in the ancient world was especially associated with greediness, envy, and stinginess, especially when used in the context of material possessions. For example, Deut. 15:7-10 exhorts the people of God not to be stingy toward one another, in the Septuagint rendering: "Do not let your eye be evil toward your brother" (Deut. 15:9). Proverbs 23:6 and 28:22 also describe a greedy or stingy person as having an evil eye."



Matthew 6:25-30

[25] "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? [26] Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? [27] And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? [28] And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, [29] yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. [30] But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? (ESV)

Matthew 6:33-34

[33] But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

[34] "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble. (ESV)

"Herein lies a deep irony of human existence. According to Jesus's teachings, when people seek to keep everything together and provide for themselves apart from God, the result is not the sought-after peace, but rather, anxiety. That is, there is an organic connection between the warning against greed in 6:22-24 and the exhortation against anxiety in 6:25-34. Greed causes anxiety. It is the non-God-directed heart that is laying up earthly treasures that ironically does not have peace. But the people who live like the flowers and birds, apparently foolish from the world's financial perspective, are the ones who are free from anxiety. They seek first God's kingdom and as a result get all their needs met without anxiety. This is not to say that all anxiety is caused by greed; there are many other sources of anxiety, real and perceived. But it is to say that greed will inevitably result in the double-souled anxiety that is the opposite of the human flourishing to which Jesus is inviting his hearers."
