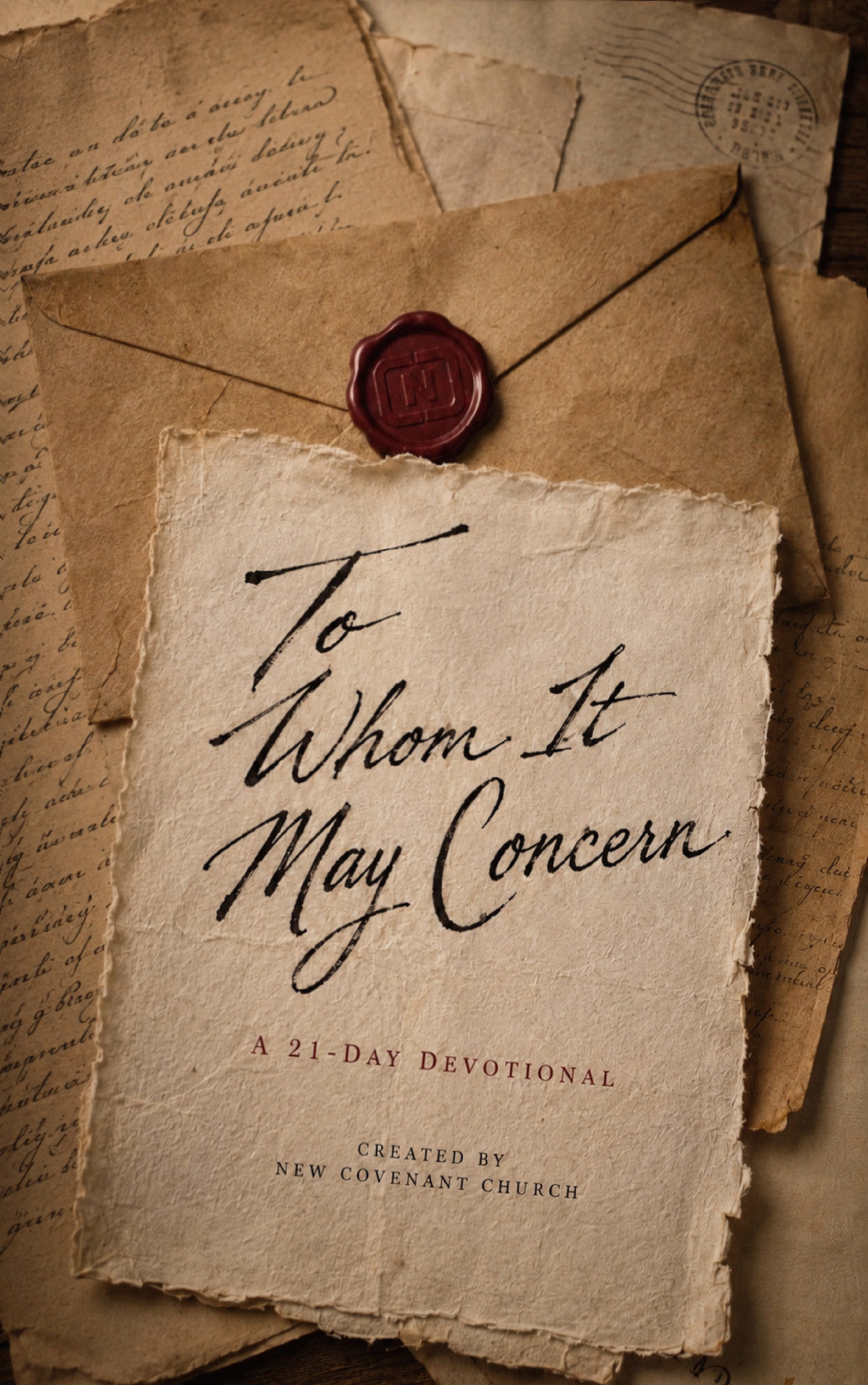

Introduction

To Whom It May Concern...

Some of us read the words “To Whom It May Concern” and think...does it concern me? What if Jesus wrote those words? You better be searching to see if it concerns you.

In the book of Revelation, Jesus writes seven letters to seven different churches. Each church faced different struggles, temptations, pressures, and failures. Yet every letter carries something the entire Church needs to hear.

The truth is, we all can drift, grow distracted, lose our first love, compromise, grow spiritual numb, tolerate sin, and get comfortable.

The book of Revelation was not written only for some distant future generation. It was written to real churches filled with real people struggling with fear, compromise, temptation, pressure, false teaching, spiritual apathy, and fading passion for Jesus...and honestly, not much has changed.

The seven churches in Revelation may have existed in ancient cities, but their struggles are still alive in the modern Church today. Some churches have become distracted by culture. Some have sacrificed truth for comfort. Some are exhausted and spiritually numb. Some look alive outwardly while dying inwardly. Some have become lukewarm, entertained, distracted, and self-sufficient.

Yet through every letter, Jesus speaks...not merely to condemn, not merely to expose but to call His people back.

This devotional is built around the seven letters found in Revelation chapters 2 and 3. Each section focuses on one church and one major spiritual condition Jesus addressed. Every 3 days starts with a modern written letter inspired by Revelation but really targeting the modern church and followed by 3 daily devotions that are inspired from the letter.

- Some of these devotionals may challenge you.
- Some may expose areas of compromise.
- Some may encourage you to endure.
- Some may call you to repent.

But every letter ultimately points back to Jesus.

- This is not a devotional about fear.
- This is not a devotional about conspiracy.
- This is a devotional about listening.

Lost First Love

Read Revelation 2:1-7

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that still gathers, still serves, still sings,
and still knows all the right things to say...

I know your works.

I have seen your faithfulness, your endurance, and your
commitment to truth. But somewhere along the way,
your love for Me has slowly faded beneath routine and
distraction.

You have learned how to stay busy in My name while
drifting from My presence.

Do not let familiarity replace wonder.
Do not let activity replace intimacy.
Do not let routine replace relationship.

I do not merely want your service. I want your heart.

Return to Me before your heart grows cold beneath
religious routine.

Return to your first love.

He who has ears to hear, let him hear what the Spirit is
saying to the churches.

Day 1

The Slow Drift

Scripture:

“But I have this complaint against you. You don’t love me or each other as you did at first!”

– Revelation 2:4 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Ephesus was doing many things right. They defended truth, worked hard, and remained faithful through difficulty. Outwardly, they looked spiritually healthy but Jesus saw something deeper. Beneath all their activity, their love for Him had slowly faded.

The same thing can happen to us. We can attend church, serve faithfully, listen to sermons, and still slowly drift from intimacy with Christ. Spiritual drift rarely happens suddenly. It usually happens quietly through distraction, routine, and a heart that slowly grows familiar with holy things.

Day 1

The Slow Drift

Reflection:

It is possible to stay active in church while quietly becoming distant from Jesus.

Question:

Has your relationship with Jesus become more routine than relational?

Your Response:

Spend intentional time with God today without distractions. Ask Him honestly if your love for Him has slowly been replaced with routine, performance, or spiritual drift.

Day 2

Remember, Repent, Redo

Scripture:

“Look how far you have fallen! Turn back to me and do the works you did at first. If you don’t repent, I will come and remove your lampstand from its place among the churches.” – Revelation 2:5 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Jesus gives the church at Ephesus a simple but powerful path back to intimacy with Him.

The 3 Rs

- Remember.
- Repent.
- Redo.

First, remember. Remember the closeness you once had with God. Remember the passion, dependence, gratitude, and hunger you once carried. Second, repent. Drift often begins when selfishness, distraction, pride, comfort, or routine slowly take the place of devotion. Jesus lovingly calls His people to turn back before their hearts grow colder. Third, redo. Love is not merely something we feel. It is something we pursue intentionally. Jesus calls His Church to return to the things that once kept them close to Him.

Day 2

Remember, Repent, Redo

Reflection:

Spiritual drift is not fixed accidentally. Returning to intimacy with Jesus requires intentional surrender and renewed devotion.

Question:

Which of the 3 Rs do you most need right now:
Remember, Repent, or Redo?

Your Response:

Spend intentional time with God today without distractions. Ask Him honestly if your love for Him has slowly been replaced with routine, performance, or spiritual drift.

Day 3

Return to Your First Love

Scripture:

“Anyone with ears to hear must listen to the Spirit and understand what he is saying to the churches. To everyone who is victorious I will give fruit from the tree of life in the paradise of God.”

– Revelation 2:7 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Jesus did not rebuke the church at Ephesus to shame them. Actually, we can learn from John 3:17 that Jesus didn't come to shame or condemn anyone but to save them. Jesus called the church to return to loving Him. Even after exposing their drift, His invitation was still rooted in grace.

Many people think repentance means punishment, but repentance is really an invitation back into closeness with God. Jesus was reminding Ephesus that it was still possible to return to intimacy, wonder, and affection for Him again. The same is true for us today. No matter how distracted, numb, or distant we may feel, Jesus still calls His people back to Himself.

Day 3

Return to Your First Love

Reflection:

Jesus does not only expose drift. He lovingly invites us back.

Question:

What would returning to your first love practically look like in your life right now?

Your Response:

Write a personal prayer to God today asking Him to renew your love for Him. Be honest about where you have drifted, become distracted, or lost spiritual passion. Ask Him to restore intimacy with Him again.

Smyrna

The Suffering Church

Read Revelation 2:8-11

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that feels pressured, rejected, and exhausted...I see you.

I have seen the moments where following me has cost you comfort, acceptance, and approval. I know the pressure you feel to stay quiet, compromise, or blend in with the world around you...but do not confuse suffering with abandonment.

The world may reject you for standing for truth, but I have not forgotten you. Do not trade faithfulness for comfort or conviction for cultural acceptance.

A comfortable church rarely depends deeply on me... but pressure has a way of teaching to cling closely to me.

Do not fear opposition more than drifting away from me.

Stay faithful. Stay courageous. Stay awake.

I am still with you in the middle of it all.

Day 4

Faithful Under Pressure

Scripture:

“Don’t be afraid of what you are about to suffer. The devil will throw some of you into prison to test you. You will suffer for ten days. But if you remain faithful even when facing death, I will give you the crown of life.” – Revelation 2:10 (NLT)

Dear brothers and sisters, when troubles of any kind come your way, consider it an opportunity for great joy. For you know that when your faith is tested, your endurance has a chance to grow. So let it grow, for when your endurance is fully developed, you will be perfect and complete, needing nothing.

– James 1:2-4 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Smyrna was suffering for following Jesus. Their faith was costly. Jesus did not promise them comfort or an easy path, but He did call them to remain faithful.

Many believers today feel pressure to stay silent, compromise convictions, or blend into culture to avoid rejection but following Jesus has never been about fitting in with the world. Faithfulness often requires courage, especially when obedience becomes uncomfortable. The testing of our faith leads to growth. Testing is a silversmith term that is used to know if the silver is pure and without blemish. You know the silver is pure when the silversmith can see their reflection. The same is true for our life, God wants us to mirror him.

Day 4

Faithful Under Pressure

Reflection:

Pressure reveals where our trust truly rests. When the suffering or testing comes, may we reflect Christ.

Question:

Where do you feel pressure to compromise or stay silent about your faith?

Your Response:

Ask God to give you courage today to remain faithful even in uncomfortable situations. Pray for boldness to stand for truth with both conviction and love.

Day 5

Do Not Fear Opposition

Scripture:

“For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline.”
– 2 Timothy 1:7 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Fear has a way of quietly controlling people. Fear of rejection. Fear of criticism. Fear of losing approval. Fear can slowly push believers toward silence and compromise.

Jesus reminded the church at Smyrna that suffering was not a sign that God had abandoned them. He was still with them in the middle of it. Sometimes opposition is not evidence that you are failing spiritually. Sometimes it is evidence that you are remaining faithful.

As the popular song by Zach Williams says, “Fear, he is a liar” ... Satan is the father of all lies and we do not need to listen to him.

Day 5

Do Not Fear Opposition

Reflection:

Fear becomes dangerous when comfort matters more than obedience.

Question:

What fear has been keeping you from fully following Jesus?

Your Response:

Bring your fears honestly before God today. Ask Him to help you value faithfulness more than comfort or approval from others.

Day 6

Cling Closely To Jesus

Scripture:

“I know about your suffering and your poverty—but you are rich! I know the blasphemy of those opposing you. They say they are Jews, but they are not, because their synagogue belongs to Satan.”

– Revelation 2:9 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Smyrna may have looked poor and weak outwardly, but Jesus saw something deeper. Their suffering had produced dependence on Him. While the world measures success through comfort, influence, and security, Jesus values faithfulness.

Pressure has a way of exposing what we truly depend on. Difficult seasons often drive believers closer to God in ways comfort never could. Sometimes God uses hardship not to push us away, but to pull us closer.

Instead of leaning into comforts of the world when hardships come, because they will come, lean into Jesus.

Day 6

Cling Closely To Jesus

Reflection:

Comfort can create independence, but hardship often deepens dependence on God.

Question:

How has difficulty or pressure shaped your relationship with God?

Your Response:

Spend time thanking God for the ways He has remained faithful to you even in difficult seasons. Ask Him to deepen your trust and dependence on Him no matter what circumstances you face.

Pergamum

The Compromising Church

Read Revelation 2:12-17

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church trying to blend truth with culture...

You are surrounded by compromise, and slowly, compromise has begun to surround your heart.

You have started tolerating what once convicted you.
You excuse what My Word calls sin.
You adjust truth to avoid rejection.

Be careful.

A church that looks too much like the world will eventually sound nothing like Me.

Do not trade holiness for acceptance.
Do not soften truth to stay comfortable.
Do not confuse cultural approval with spiritual fruitfulness.

I have called My people to stand apart, not blend in.

Remain faithful to truth, even when compromise becomes popular.

Day 7

The Slow Compromise

Scripture:

“But I have a few complaints against you. You tolerate some among you whose teaching is like that of Balaam, who showed Balak how to trip up the people of Israel. He taught them to sin by eating food offered to idols and by committing sexual sin.”
– Revelation 2:14 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Compromise rarely begins with outright rebellion. It usually begins with small steps away from truth in order to stay comfortable, accepted, or approved by others. Over time, convictions that once felt clear slowly become negotiable.

The church at Pergamum was surrounded by a culture opposed to God, and eventually some within the church began tolerating what God had clearly called sin. The same danger exists today. A church that constantly adjusts truth to fit culture will eventually lose the courage to stand apart from it.

May we be a people, who will stand set-a-part by God from the culture around us and because of our faithfulness, we will see a shift in the culture.

Day 7

The Slow Compromise

Reflection:

Small compromises repeated over time slowly reshape the heart. We must be a people of conviction, if we don't then we will fall for anything.

Question:

Where have you been tempted to soften truth in order to avoid rejection or discomfort?

Your Response:

Ask God to reveal any area where compromise has quietly entered your heart. Pray for courage to stand firmly on truth even when it feels unpopular.

Day 8

Truth Without Compromise

Scripture:

“Don’t copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God’s will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect.” – Romans 12:2 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Culture constantly pressures believers to redefine truth, morality, and identity. What was once clearly called sin is now often celebrated, defended, or normalized. The pressure to blend in can slowly make conviction feel extreme.

God never called His people to mirror culture. He called His people to be transformed by Him.

Christians are not meant to be shaped primarily by trends, politics, entertainment, or public opinion.

We are meant to be shaped by the Word of God.

Day 8

Truth Without Compromise

Reflection:

The more culture shapes our thinking, the harder it becomes to recognize compromise.

Question:

What voices have been influencing your thinking more than God's Word lately?

Your Response:

Spend time in Scripture today and ask God to renew your thinking. Identify one area where culture has influenced your perspective more than biblical truth.

Day 9

Standing Apart

Scripture:

“You are the salt of the earth. But what good is salt if it has lost its flavor? Can you make it salty again? It will be thrown out and trampled underfoot as worthless. “You are the light of the world—like a city on a hilltop that cannot be hidden.”
– Matthew 5:13-14 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Jesus never called His followers to blend into the world around them. Salt only works when it remains distinct, and light only matters when it shines in darkness. The church at Pergamum struggled because they were becoming too comfortable with compromise instead of standing faithfully apart.

Faithfulness to Jesus will sometimes make believers look different from the culture around them. That difference should not come from arrogance or hostility, but from holiness, conviction, love, and obedience to Christ.

Day 9

Standing Apart

Reflection:

You cannot influence darkness effectively if you slowly begin to resemble it.

Question:

What areas of your life look more shaped by the culture, than by Christ?

Your Response:

Ask God to help you live faithfully and distinctly in a culture that constantly pressures believers to compromise. Choose one practical way today to honor Christ boldly rather than simply fitting in.

Thyatira

The Corrupted Church

Read Revelation 2:18-29

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that has learned to tolerate what should be confronted...

I see your service, your generosity, and your passion.
But you have allowed compromise and deception to remain unchecked among you.

You celebrate tolerance while ignoring holiness.
You excuse sin in the name of love.
You allow voices to shape you that do not sound like Mine.

Love without truth is not love at all.

Do not become so afraid of offending people that you stop obeying Me.

I have not called My Church to reflect culture.
I have called My Church to reflect Christ.

Return to discernment.
Return to holiness.
Return to truth.

Day 10

Tolerating What God Calls Sin

Scripture:

“But I have this complaint against you. You are permitting that woman—that Jezebel who calls herself a prophet—to lead my servants astray. She teaches them to commit sexual sin and to eat food offered to idols.” – Revelation 2:20 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Thyatira was not rebuked because they lacked passion or service. In many ways, they were thriving outwardly. But they tolerated compromise and deception that should have been confronted.

One of the greatest dangers in the modern Church is becoming so focused on avoiding offense that we stop speaking truth. Love without truth eventually becomes compromise. Jesus never called His Church to celebrate what He clearly calls sin. He called His people to walk in holiness while still loving people deeply.

Day 10

Tolerating What God Calls Sin

Reflection:

What we tolerate long enough eventually begins shaping us.

Question:

Are there areas where you have become comfortable with what God is calling you to confront?

Your Response:

Ask God to give you discernment and courage to recognize compromise clearly. Pray for wisdom to walk in both truth and love without compromising either.

Day 11

Voices That Shape Us

Scripture:

“I gave her time to repent, but she does not want to turn away from her immorality.”

– Revelation 2:21 (NLT)

“but test everything that is said. Hold on to what is good.” – 1 Thessalonians 5:21 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Thyatira allowed voices to influence them that did not reflect the heart of God. The same challenge exists today. We are constantly being shaped by influencers, entertainment, social media, politics, culture, and public opinion.

Not every voice speaking confidently is speaking truthfully. Discernment matters because whatever repeatedly shapes our thinking will eventually shape our lives. God never intended His people to absorb culture without question. He calls His Church to measure every voice against His Word.

Day 11

Voices That Shape Us

Reflection:

The voices you listen to consistently will eventually shape the direction of your heart.

Question:

What voices or influences have been shaping your thinking more than Scripture lately?

Your Response:

Take inventory of what has been influencing your heart and mind recently. Ask God to help you filter every voice through the truth of His Word.

Day 12

Called to Reflect Christ

Scripture:

“But I also have a message for the rest of you in Thyatira who have not followed this false teaching (‘deeper truths,’ as they call them—depths of Satan, actually). I will ask nothing more of you except that you hold tightly to what you have until I come.”
– Revelation 2:24-25 (NLT)

“Instead, we will speak the truth in love, growing in every way more and more like Christ, who is the head of his body, the church.” – Ephesians 4:15 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Jesus never called His Church to reflect the culture around it. He called His Church to reflect Him. That means walking in both truth and love together. Truth without love becomes harsh, but love without truth eventually loses its foundation.

The church at Thyatira struggled because they tolerated compromise in the name of acceptance. But real love does not ignore what destroys people spiritually. Jesus calls His people to live differently... not arrogantly, but faithfully, humbly, and courageously.

Day 12

Called to Reflect Christ

Reflection:

The goal of the Christian life is not cultural acceptance but Christlike transformation.

Question:

In what area of your life is God calling you to reflect Christ more clearly?

Your Response:

Ask God to help you represent Him faithfully in both your words and your actions. Pray for the courage to stand in truth while still loving people the way Jesus did.

Sardis

The Dead Church

Read Revelation 3:1-6

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that looks alive on the outside...

People admire your image, your activity, and your appearance of strength. But outward reputation cannot replace inward life.

You have learned how to appear spiritually healthy while neglecting true dependence on Me.

You fill rooms but lack prayer.

You create content but lack conviction.

You impress people while quietly drifting spiritually asleep.

Wake up.

Do not mistake activity for life or appearance for transformation.

I desire more than outward religion.

I desire hearts fully awake to My presence.

Return before what remains grows cold completely.

Day 13

Wake Up

Scripture:

“I know all the things you do, and that you have a reputation for being alive—but you are dead. Wake up! Strengthen what little remains, for even what is left is almost dead. I find that your actions do not meet the requirements of my God.”
– Revelation 3:1b-2 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Sardis looked spiritually alive from the outside. They had a reputation, activity, and appearance of health. But Jesus saw beyond the image. Beneath the surface, spiritual life was fading.

One of the greatest dangers in the modern Church is confusing activity with intimacy with God. We can attend services, lead ministries, create content, and stay busy while quietly becoming spiritually numb. Outward success cannot replace inward surrender.

Jesus lovingly calls His people to wake up before spiritual apathy fully takes over.

Day 13

Wake Up

Reflection:

It is possible to appear spiritually alive while quietly drifting inwardly.

Question:

Are there areas of your spiritual life that look healthy outwardly but feel empty inwardly?

Your Response:

Ask God to reveal any area where spiritual routine has replaced genuine intimacy with Him. Spend intentional quiet time with Him today without distraction.

Day 14

Strengthen What Remains

Scripture:

“Go back to what you heard and believed at first; hold to it firmly. Repent and turn to me again. If you don’t wake up, I will come to you suddenly, as unexpected as a thief.” – Revelation 3:3 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Even though Sardis was spiritually struggling, Jesus said there was still something that remained worth strengthening. Not everything was gone.

Sometimes spiritual drift happens slowly through distraction, exhaustion, disappointment, or comfort. But Jesus does not call His people to hopelessness. He calls them to repentance and restoration.

God often begins renewal with small acts of surrender. A returning prayer life. A renewed hunger for Scripture. A softening heart. A willingness to listen again.

Revival often starts quietly before it grows visibly.

Day 14

Strengthen What Remains

Reflection:

Jesus does not abandon drifting people. He calls them back.

Question:

What part of your relationship with God needs strengthening right now?

Your Response:

Identify one spiritual habit or area of obedience that has weakened in your life. Take one intentional step today to begin rebuilding it.

Day 15

Faithfulness Over Reputation

Scripture:

“All who are victorious will be clothed in white. I will never erase their names from the Book of Life, but I will announce before my Father and his angels that they are mine.” – Revelation 3:5 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Sardis cared deeply about reputation, but Jesus cared about faithfulness.

The world often celebrates appearance, influence, and public success but heaven values endurance, obedience, and genuine devotion to Christ. God is not impressed by spiritual performance that lacks true surrender.

Even in Sardis, there were still faithful believers who had not compromised. God always preserves a remnant that continues to walk faithfully with Him.

Faithfulness matters more than popularity.

Day 15

Faithfulness Over Reputation

Reflection:

God sees beyond outward appearance and looks directly at the heart.

Question:

Have you been more concerned with outward image or inward faithfulness?

Your Response:

Ask God to help you pursue genuine faithfulness rather than simply maintaining appearances before others.

Philadelphia

The Faithful Church

Read Revelation 3:7-13

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that feels weak but continues to remain faithful...

I have seen your endurance.
I have seen your obedience in difficult places.
I have seen the moments where you stayed faithful when nobody else noticed.

Do not grow weary.

The world celebrates platforms, influence, and popularity, but heaven still honors faithfulness.

You may feel small, overlooked, or insignificant, but obedience matters deeply to Me.

Keep walking faithfully.
Keep trusting Me.
Keep holding firmly to truth.

I am able to open doors no one can shut.

- *Jesus*

Day 16

The Open Door

Scripture:

“I know all the things you do, and I have opened a door for you that no one can close.”

– Revelation 3:8a (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Philadelphia was not known for power, influence, or size. In fact, Jesus said they had “little strength.” Yet they remained faithful.

God often works powerfully through people who feel weak but remain obedient. The Philadelphia Church trusted God more than their own abilities, and Jesus honored their faithfulness by opening doors no one could shut.

The Kingdom of God has always moved forward through surrendered people who simply continue saying yes to Jesus.

Day 16

The Open Door

Reflection:

God is able to use weakness that is fully surrendered to Him.

Question:

Where do you feel weak or inadequate right now?

Your Response:

Bring your weaknesses honestly before God today. Ask Him to help you trust His strength instead of your own abilities.

Day 17

Little Strength, Great Faithfulness

Scripture:

“You have little strength, yet you obeyed my word and did not deny me.” – Revelation 3:8b (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The Church in Philadelphia reminds us that God values faithfulness more than worldly success. They were not commended for being impressive. They were commended for remaining obedient.

Many believers today feel discouraged because they do not feel strong, influential, or gifted enough. Throughout Scripture, God repeatedly uses ordinary people who depend deeply on Him.

Weakness is not disqualifying when it leads us toward dependence on God.

Day 17

Little Strength, Great Faithfulness

Reflection:

God is not looking for impressive people. He is looking for faithful people.

Question:

How might God want to use your weakness to deepen your dependence on Him?

Your Response:

Ask God to help you remain faithful even when you feel weak, overlooked, or discouraged.

Day 18

Hold Firmly

Scripture:

“I am coming soon. Hold on to what you have, so that no one will take away your crown.”

– Revelation 3:11 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

Faithfulness requires endurance. Jesus encouraged the believers in Philadelphia to hold firmly to truth and continue walking faithfully.

The pressure to compromise, grow weary, or slowly drift away from conviction is real. Jesus reminds His people not to let go. The reward of eternity is worth far more than temporary comfort or cultural approval.

In a constantly shifting culture, believers are called to remain steady, grounded, and faithful to Christ.

Day 18

Hold Firmly

Reflection:

Endurance matters because faithfulness over time shapes the heart.

Question:

Where are you most tempted to grow weary or compromise?

Your Response:

Ask God to strengthen your endurance and help you remain faithful even when following Him becomes difficult.

Laodicea

The Lukewarm Church

Read Revelation 3:14-22

To Whom It May Concern,

To the Church that has grown comfortable...

You have become satisfied with a faith that costs very little.

You have learned how to appear spiritually secure while remaining distant from true dependence on Me.

Comfort has replaced surrender.
Convenience has replaced conviction.
Self-sufficiency has replaced desperation for God.

You say you have everything you need, yet many hearts have grown spiritually cold.

Wake up before comfort numbs your hunger for Me completely.

I am not calling you to casual Christianity.
I am calling you to wholehearted devotion.

Return to dependence.
Return to surrender.
Return to spiritual hunger.

Day 19

Comfortable Christianity

Scripture:

“I know all the things you do, that you are neither hot nor cold. I wish that you were one or the other!

– Revelation 3:15 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Laodicea had become spiritually comfortable. They believed they were fine because outwardly they appeared successful, secure, and self-sufficient but Jesus saw what others could not see. Their hearts had grown lukewarm.

Lukewarm Christianity is dangerous because it often feels spiritually safe. It settles for routine without surrender, knowledge without hunger, and convenience without sacrifice. Comfort can quietly numb our desperation for God if we are not careful.

Day 19

Comfortable Christianity

Reflection:

Spiritual comfort can slowly replace spiritual hunger.

Question:

Where have you grown spiritually comfortable instead of spiritually dependent on God?

Your Response:

Ask God to reveal any area where comfort has replaced surrender in your life. Pray for renewed hunger and passion for Him again.

Day 20

Refined by Fire

Scripture:

“So I advise you to buy gold from me—gold that has been purified by fire. Then you will be rich. Also buy white garments from me so you will not be shamed by your nakedness, and ointment for your eyes so you will be able to see.” – Revelation 3:18 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

The church at Laodicea believed they were spiritually rich, but Jesus revealed their true condition. They had become self-sufficient and spiritually lukewarm.

Jesus told them to seek gold refined by fire. Refined gold becomes pure through heat and pressure. In the same way, God often uses difficulty to expose self-reliance and deepen dependence on Him.

Comfort can quietly weaken spiritual hunger if we are not careful. Sometimes God allows discomfort not to harm us, but to draw us closer to Himself.

Day 20

Refined by Fire

Reflection:

God often uses pressure to refine our faith and restore dependence on Him.

Question:

What circumstances might God be using right now to refine your heart?

Your Response:

Ask God to use both comfort and difficulty to draw you closer to Him rather than further away.

Day 21

Jesus at The Door

Scripture:

“Look! I stand at the door and knock. If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in, and we will share a meal together as friends.”

– Revelation 3:20 (NLT)

Expanded Insight:

One of the saddest pictures in Revelation is Jesus standing outside the door of His own church. The Church in Laodicea had become so distracted by comfort and self-sufficiency that they no longer deeply depended on Him.

Yet even here, Jesus responds with grace. He knocks. He invites. He calls His people back into fellowship with Him.

Jesus does not force His way into our lives. He desires willing surrender and restored intimacy. No matter how far someone has drifted spiritually, the invitation to return still remains open.

Day 21

Jesus at The Door

Reflection:

Jesus still pursues hearts that have slowly drifted from Him.

Question:

Is there any area of your life where Jesus is calling you back into deeper surrender?

Your Response:

Spend time honestly inviting Jesus back into every area of your life. Ask Him to restore intimacy, dependence, and spiritual hunger again.

To Whom It May Concern

If you've read through these pages, one question remains: **Does this concern you?**

The seven letters in Revelation were written to real churches filled with real people. They were people who struggled with fear, compromise, spiritual drift, false teaching, complacency, and lukewarm faith. In many ways, they are our story too.

Perhaps, somewhere throughout this devotional, you found yourself in one of those letters. Maybe you realized you've drifted from your first love. Maybe you've compromised your convictions. Maybe you've tolerated what God has called you to confront. Maybe you've become spiritually numb or comfortable.

The good news is that Jesus doesn't simply expose our hearts, He came to redeem them. The Bible tells us that every person has sinned and fallen short of God's glorious standard (Romans 3:23). Sin separates us from a holy God, and there is nothing we can do through our own goodness, religion, or effort to restore that relationship. God loves us too much to leave us there.

Jesus Christ, the Son of God, lived the perfect life we could never live. He willingly went to the cross, taking upon Himself the punishment for our sins that we deserved. Three days later, He rose from the grave, defeating sin and death so that anyone who places their faith in Him can receive forgiveness, new life, and the promise of eternity with Him.

The invitation of the gospel has always been the same:
Repent and believe.

Turn from trusting yourself and place your trust completely in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

Salvation is not earned by good works, church attendance, or religious activity. It is received by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone.
(Ephesians 2:8-9)

If today you recognize your need for Jesus, don't ignore His invitation. Confess your sin. Trust in His finished work on the cross. Receive His forgiveness. Follow Him with your life.

If you've made that decision today, tell someone. Be baptized as a public declaration of your faith. Commit yourself to prayer, God's Word, and the fellowship of other believers as you grow to become more like Christ.

Whether this devotional has encouraged you, convicted you, or awakened you, don't let it end as simply another book you've read. Let it become a life you've surrendered.
