Prepping vs. Prepared

Hebrews 11:7

"By faith Noah, being warned by God concerning events as yet unseen, in reverent fear constructed an ark for the saving of his household. By this he condemned the world and became an heir of the righteousness that comes by faith."

By the time you read this, the winter storm of last week is over. While I am writing this article, the storm has not yet come. I don't know if we received 24 inches of snow/ice or none at all. And yet I will acknowledge this, I spent the week leading up to the storm preparing. Anna and I went through our grocery list, planning meals. I checked our shovels and the salt bucket. We disconnected hoses, made sure the pool was at a safe level, checked bathrooms to make sure pipes wouldn't freeze and so on. We were prepping for an event that was yet to come. And now, after all that prepping, as I write this article, I have the peace that comes from being prepared.

As I think about this I can't help but see the social media posts of people buying gallons and gallons of milk, toilet paper, and anything else they might need, I couldn't help but think, "even if we got shut down for 2 weeks, how can you go through that much milk? And when the storm is over isn't the excess milk going to spoil?" And that then led me to ask, "Are we prepping in the right way or are we prepping to be prepared?"

Now apply that question to your walk as a Christian. Are we prepping in the right way or to be actually prepared for the day of the Lord's return? The truth is, that as Christians we often feel like we are properly preparing our household and yet can easily focus on wrong preparations, ones that may serve a very real purpose here on earth but do not carry us to being prepared for eternity.

As the bible verse above, from Hebrews chapter 11 so clearly points out. In it the author uses the example of Noah, who followed the warning of God and built an ark. He didn't know when the flood was going to come and yet prepared for when it did.

On the converse side, our author, points out that the world was not prepared, thus perishing, while Noah's family was declared righteous for having prepared by following the commands of God.

If we apply this to our walks as Christians then we should ask ourselves what makes us prepared for what is to come next? Here are three takeaways from the account of Noah that believe will help us answer this question.

1. Keep your focus on God's revelation! Just as God warned Noah and Noah responded by seeking to walk according to that revelation, even as the world mocked him, so too must we focus upon what God has revealed to us. We are saved by Christ and fully reliant upon His grace and mercy, He is our ark.
2. Prioritize your resources and I am not just talking about money. Noah had finite resources, trees, laborers, etc. and yet God allowed him to build the ark and protect his family. So too do we have finite resources, we have finite time, etc. and so devote them to the service of the Lord who is the ultimate protector and sustainer. Instead of buying into the things of this world, like so many gallons of milk which are great for today and yet will spoil a few days later, devote them to the one who sustains all things.
3. Trust in the God who makes us righteous and not in our own abilities. The truth is that as Anna and I prepared for the Winter Storm, we felt prepared and yet we didn't know what would happen. So too do we trust in the righteousness of the God who, by faith has prepared us for what is to come and not in our own prepping.

Stay warm, God Bless and We can't wait to see you.

Table of Duties: The Forgotten Stewardship Tool

Luther's Small Catechism is a magnificent tool. Joined with a well-used copy of the Holy Scriptures and an orthodox hymnal, and the Christian is well equipped to live a life of faithfulness to the Lord and service to the neighbor. First in German and now in English and just about any language known to man, this handy masterpiece has introduced generations of people to the central doctrine of justification by grace, through faith, on account of Jesus Christ. The Six Chief Parts have proven to be a faithful framework for a clear confession of the truth of the Gospel for nearly five hundred years!

But more than a textbook, the Small Catechism also serves well as a handbook for Christian living. As a part of its treasure, there is an element that teaches an extraordinarily strong message of stewardship. That hidden treasure that needs to be rediscovered is called the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties is really nothing more than a categorized gathering of Bible verses. These verses are set apart for "various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." Addressing pastors and people, government and citizens, husbands, wives, children, youth, workers and so many more, it very clearly lays out what faithful stewardship looks like. Even better, these assembled passages teach one important truth: we are stewards of one another!

The Table is much more than a "how-to" tool; it also lays out the interconnectedness that exists within the body of Christ. Pastors are described by what they are to be as stewards of the Word. 1 Timothy 3 highlights the characteristics of a faithful pastor. Even more, Titus 1 highlights the need for the pastor to be faithful for the sake of those under his care.

Those who hear the faithful preaching of the pastor are stewards of the pastor as well. 1 Corinthians 9 talks about the need for the people to support the livelihood of the pastor. Galatians 6 talks about how the hearers share in the good things that the pastor teaches. 1 Timothy 6 talks about the honor that is owed to the pastor, not because of WHO he is, but rather WHAT he is teaching! Hebrews 13 shows the impact of this stewardship on the pastor, that they perform their duties with joy. Joyful pastors and people are always going to be better stewards of the Gospel!

Outside the church this interdependent stewardship is on display as well. Romans 13 highlights the respect necessary for the governing authorities. As citizens, the faithful steward is called to pay taxes (Matthew 22), pray for their leaders (1 Timothy 2) and that they should be ready to serve in the civil realm (Titus 3), because they are in these positions by God's direction (1 Peter 2).

These steward duties are in the home too! 1 Peter 3 and Colossians 3 shape the husband steward. Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3 shape the wife steward. Ephesians 6 form parental stewards and child stewards.

The Table of Duties is a wonderful place for the individual steward to learn how much our stewardship is more than just a "me and Jesus thing!" In fact, it ends with these words: "Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well share fare." This is interdependent stewardship on clear display. As each learns stewardship in this way, the more faithful we will be as a family, congregations, communities and the church at large.

Panel 1—Luther’s Coat of Arms

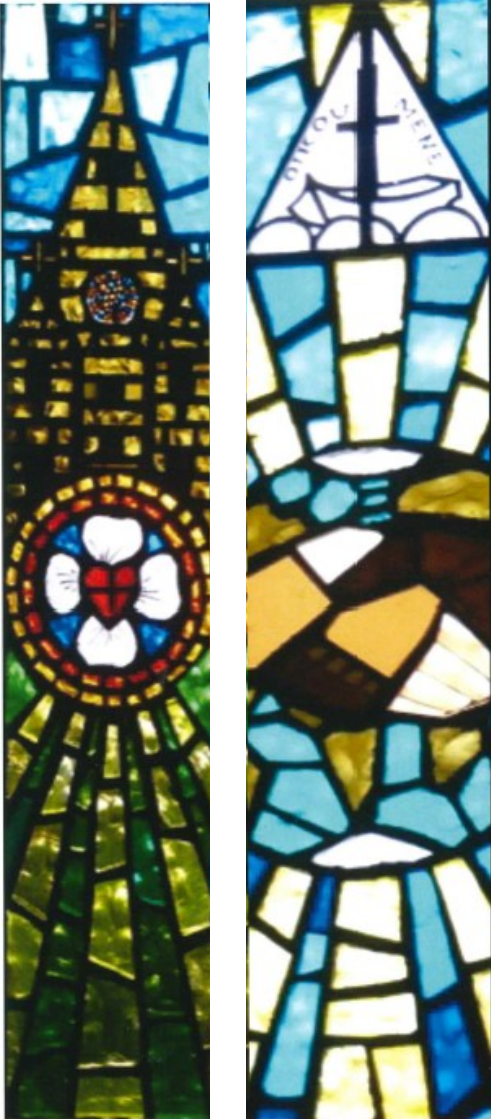
In Memory of Wm. R. Letterman, Sr. and Wm. R. Letterman, Jr.

This panel shows the Reformation seal and represents the time Martin Luther nailed the 95 theses to the castle church door in Wittenberg, Germany. The beams of light represents the spread of Lutheranism and mission work to the five continents. The green represents the earth.

Panel 2—The Brotherhood of Man

At the top of the panel, the Ecumenical symbol is used to represent the time when all Christian churches will come together and worship God. In the center are all races of the world shaking hands with the rest of the world. The beams of light illuminate the world and signify that peace will come when all people will worship God together. “Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.” Matt. 7:12

God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

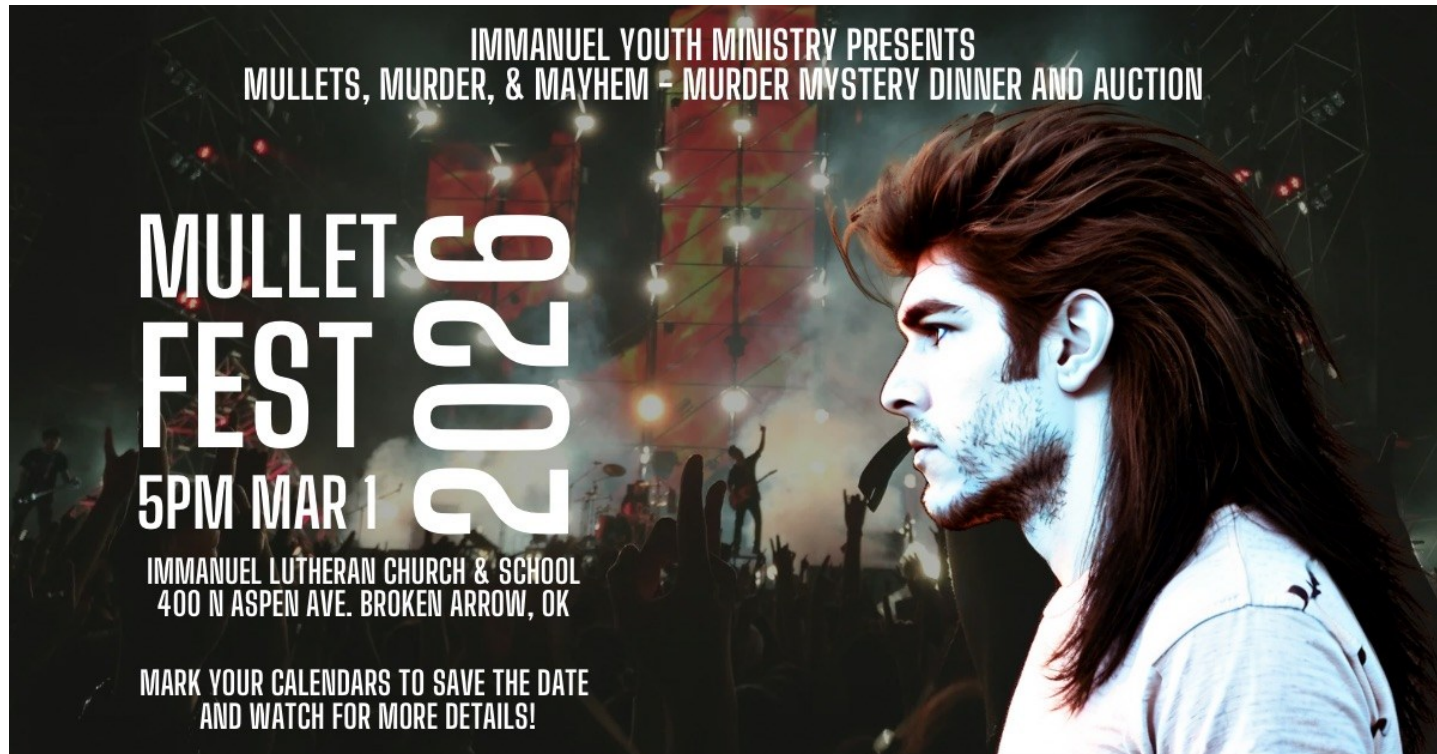
It is our great opportunity and joy to read and study God’s Word. One beneficial practice is to memorize the Scriptures and, in so doing, to meditate on it.

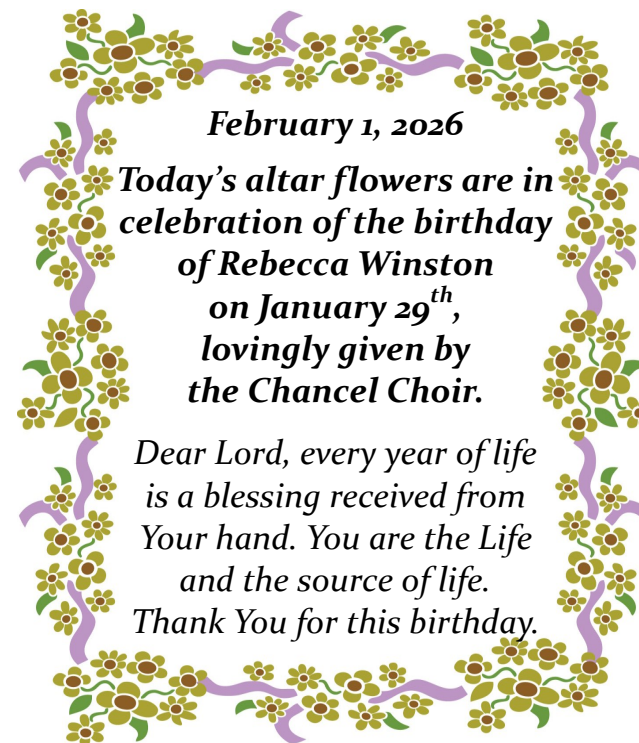
