- 2. Ruth is placed right after Judges. See Judges 17:6, 18:1, 19:1, 21:25 What do we know about the story of Judges and how would this affect our reading of Ruth? Why is it important for us to study the Hebrew Bible? See Romans 15:4. The books of the bible are intentionally placed in a particular order that is not necessarily chronological. See also Numbers 21-25, where the Moabites prevent the Israelities from traveling through their land. How does knowing the history change how you read the story? What do you think is the significance of Naomi and Elimelech going to Moab?
