Evidence of Abrahamic Covenant's Unconditional Nature


- ANE covenant ratification ceremony (Gen 15)
- Lack of stated conditions for Israel's obedience (Gen 15)
- Covenant's eternality (Gen 17:7, 13, 19; Ps. 90:2)
- Covenant's immutability (Heb 6:13-18; Mal. 3:6)
- Trans-generational reaffirmation despite perpetual national disobedience (Jer 31:35-37)




Land Promises Fulfilled in the Time of Joshua (Josh. 11:23; 21:43-45) or Solomon (1 Kgs. 4:21)?

- Extended context (Josh 13:1-7; Judges 1:19, 21, 27, 29, 30-36)
- Land gained in conquest was only a fraction of what was promised (1 Kgs. 4:25)
- Jerusalem not conquered in Joshua's day (Josh 15:63; 2 Sam 5)
- Solomon's reign extended to the border of Egypt (1 Kgs. 4:21) and not the River of Egypt (Gen. 15:18)
- Solomon's reign was tributary only (1 Kgs. 4:21)
- Forever? (Gen 17:7-8, 13, 19)
- Reaffirmation of land promises long after Joshua and Solomon's time (Amos 9:11-15)

"4:10. Remarkably, Moses raised a fourth and final objection, bemoaning to the Lord that he was not a commanding speaker, being slow of speech, and of a slow tongue. In light of Stephen's testimony of Moses' abilities (Acts 7:22), it would seem that a speech impediment was not the flaw that Moses has in mind. Rather, it was a fear of intimidation before the Egyptian court apprehension that he lacked commensurate eloquence and adequate fluency for the task."




"4:15–16. The Lord answered Moses' request by bringing a third party into the equation, Moses' brother, Aaron. God begrudgingly indulged Moses' reluctance to expound the divine message. Although Moses was commissioned to serve as God's mouthpiece, Aaron was likewise commissioned to be Moses' mouthpiece. A three-way system was arranged whereby God would first speak to Moses. Moses would then convey the divine will to Aaron. Finally, Aaron would then publicly broadcast the message."




GATES OF NEHEMIAH





Exodus 4:21 - "harden his heart. Ten times it is said that Pharaoh hardened his own heart (7:13, 14, 22; 8:15, 19, 32; 9:7, 34, 35; 13:15), and 10 times that God hardened Pharaoh's heart (4:21; 7:3; 9:12; 10:1, 20, 27; 11:10; 14:4, 8, 17). Paul uses this as an example of the inscrutable will of God and of His mercy toward men (Rom. 9:14–18). Seven times Pharaoh hardened his own heart before God first hardened it, though the prediction that God would do it preceded all."



"4:21. I will harden his heart. An expression meaning 'to strengthen his will.' The text identifies the heart as the location of the volition, man's decision-making ability. On seven occasions in the narrative, God hardens Pharaoh's heart (9:12; 10:1, 20, 27; 11:10; 14:4, 8) or foretells that He will harden Pharaoh's heart (4:21; 7:3), and nine times in the text, Pharaoh hardens his own heart (7:13, 14, 22; 8:15, 19, 32; 9:7, 34–35). For the initial five plagues, the text registers Pharaoh as the agent of hardening. Not until the sixth plague does God participate in the confirmation of Pharaoh's own volitional choices."



"4:24. Apparently, Moses failed to circumcise his second son, Eliezer, in violation of the Abrahamic covenant (Gen. 17:9–14). It would have been flagrantly inappropriate for God's chosen representative, the deliverer of His people, not to comply with such a basic command, the very sign and symbol of the covenant relationship itself."
