Questions to consider for meditation:

- 1. From vs. 7, How does your being accepted by Christ, influence how you are to accept others in the body of Christ? In what ways would it not, (in other words, what are some areas/things we are not to accept in others)? What should be visible in your fellowship and unity with the body of Christ if God is to be glorified by it?
- 2. In what ways does singing (vv. 9-12) fulfill the call of vv. 5-6? Musical praise, as quoted in vs. 9 and 11 are a significant part of worship in the OT, as well as the NT. What advantage do you believe music provides, over just speaking words to one another?
- 3. From vs. 13, How does a biblical understanding of hope change how you are presently living? Consider where you are presently regarding the filling of God and the abounding in hope; what measure would you see in yourself little-filled, half-filled, very-filled, partially-filled? What are some things in life that undermine the work of the Holy Spirit, as described in vs. 13?
