10 The heart knows its own bitterness, and no stranger shares its joy.

- 1. What does this proverb say about the hiddenness of our inmost emotions?
- 2. Bitterness is resentment due to perceived unfairness. Can you think of some examples of where do you experience bitterness?
 - a. In yourself?
 - b. In others?

Hebrews 12:12-17 (ESV)

¹²Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees, ¹³and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed. ¹⁴Strive for peace with everyone, and for the holiness without which no one will see the Lord. ¹⁵See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no "root of bitterness" springs up and causes trouble, and by it many become defiled; ¹⁶that no one is sexually immoral or unholy like Esau, who sold his birthright for a single meal. ¹⁷For you know that afterward, when he desired to inherit the blessing, he was rejected, for he found no chance to repent, though he sought it with tears.
