- Apostles to Athanasius
  - By 100 AD, all the apostles had died and all NT books were written and acknowledged (informally, by use) as authoritative and equivalent to the Old Testament.
  - By 150 AD, Christianity was seen as ... clearly distinct from Judaism ... but also a threat (by many)
    - Christianity's zealous evangelism and explosive growth seemed a threat to both Judaism & Rome
    - Jews saw Christians as idolaters because they worshipped a human (Jesus), not the one, true, invisible God Yahweh
    - Rome saw Christians as atheists because they wouldn't worship the Emperor or Roman gods

Apostles to Athanasius

<u>150 – 300 AD</u> – Age of Apologists

- Threats to Christianity emerged from the Outside
  - Roman Empire (persecutions)
  - Pagan Philosophers
- Threats to Christianity emerged from the Inside
  - Erroneous teaching by those claiming to be Christians
- Christianity was under duress and in survival mode
- Apologetics = a reasoned defense of the faith

   to show that it's truthful and intellectually credible
- Apologists: Justin Martyr ... Irenaeus ... Tertullian ... Clement of Alexandria ... Origen

<u>300 – 600 AD</u> – Age of Theologians

#### Context

#### Constantine

- Roman Emperor in 312 AD
- Edict of Milan in 313 AD
- Controversy
  - Arius of Alexandria (Egypt)
  - God ... the Father ... the Son
  - <u>John 14:28</u>

I am going to the Father, for the Father is greater than I

- John 3:16 God gave his only begotten Son
- <u>Colossians 1:15</u> He is the ... firstborn of all creation

#### Context


- Council of Nicea
  - 325 AD <u>Nicene Creed</u>

... "We believe in ... one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, begotten from the Father ... begotten *not made*, of *one substance* with the Father ..."

- However, Arianism did not go away (alive thru song)
- Bishop Alexander attended, and brought his assistant, Athanasius.
- Bishop Alexander died in 328 AD ...
- At almost age 30, Athanasius succeeded him ...

• <u>Athanasius</u> (295-373 AD)

- Black African
- Bishop of Alexandria ... for 46 years
- Exiled and brought back
   5 times due to his defense of The Trinity



#### Contributions

- Instrumental in developing the *Nicene Creed* (325 AD)
- On the Incarnation of the Word [Logos] ... argues for the full deity of the Son
- Against the Arians ... refutes Arianism
- His Arguments
  - Nature of God is community in unity
  - Scripture presents God having *always* been Father and the Son having *always* been; thus, the Son is also God
  - *"Begotten"* is a biblical trait of the Son (John 3:16)
    - Not: brought into existence or created at a point in time
    - *Making* results in something of a *different* sort
    - *Begetting* results in something of the *same* kind
    - Nicene Creed: "... begotten not made."

Contributions

#### • <u>Nicene Creed</u>

I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible. And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the **only-begotten** Son of God, **begotten of the Father** before all worlds; God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God; **begotten, not made**, being <u>of one substance</u> [homoousios] with the Father, by whom all things were made.

- Greek: *homoousios* = "of the same nature, being, essence, or substance"
- Arians: this is not a biblical word
- Athanasius: true, but it's a biblical concept (as is Trinity)

- Contributions
  - God's Unchanging Nature
    - Doesn't The Incarnation jeopardize this? ...
    - Athanasius' Argument: No! ...
      - The Son's fully divine nature was not changed through the Incarnation
      - A human nature was added to the Son's unchanging divine nature
    - What about ...
      - John 14:28 "The Father is greater than I" ...?
      - When Jesus is described as hungry or tired?
    - Athanasius:

...these apply to his *human* nature, not his divine nature

- Contributions
  - Why is all this so important?
    - Without the *full deity* of Christ, the salvation of humanity is impossible because *only God* can save
    - Sin resulted in death. Thus, true salvation requires (among other things) the giving of life.
    - Only the source of life (God) can give life.
    - Such salvation is a sharing in the divine nature
    - Salvation brings together humanity and deity, which sin separated.
    - Only God can accomplish such salvation—particularly, only the One in whom both deity and humanity have already been brought together: Jesus Christ

- Contributions
  - *"He was made man that we might be made God"* Athanasius, On the Incarnation of the Word, 54.3
    - Doesn't mean salvation makes humans equal with God
    - <u>2 Peter 1:3-4</u>

[God's] divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us to his own glory and excellence, 4 by which he has granted to us his precious and very great promises, so that through them you may become *partakers of the divine nature* ....

This is Jesus' goal when he prayed in John 17:21-23:
 ... that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us ... I in them and you in me ....

- Contributions
  - 367 AD
    - Athanasius wrote his *Easter Letter* 
      - Listed the Old and New Testament canonical books
    - Council of Laodicea
      - Reacted to the heretical music of Arius by forbidding congregational singing in the churches

... which lasted until the Reformation
