<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

Q7a – Was John Mark a leader in the Coptic Church?

- Coptic means Egyptian
- Coptic Christians claim John Mark was the first to bring the Gospel to Africa when he evangelized the Egyptian people (in Alexandria) between 42 – 62 AD.
- Coptic religion believed in "eternal life" and worshipped "god" but with a focus on the Pyramids.
- He was 1st bishop of the Coptic Church Alexandria, Egypt
- Alexandria joined Antioch & Rome as the 3 most important centers of the ancient church
- Coptic Christians have suffered severe persecution, first under Roman emperors (thru 300 AD), then Byzantine rule (~ 330-640 AD), then Islamic rule (from 641 AD on).
- Number of Coptic Christians worldwide today: ~ 10-60 million

- Short answer authored 13 (or 14?) out of $27 = about \frac{1}{2}$ of NT

 - Galatians

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

- Longer answer key to answering objections of textual critics
- Distinction between writing and authorship in an oral culture

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- Distinction between writing and authorship in an oral culture
- <u>Amanuensis</u> = ancient near eastern "secretary" or "scribe"
 - <u>2 Thess 3:16-18</u>—[after Benediction:] ¹⁷ I, Paul, write this greeting with my own hand. This is the sign of genuineness in every letter of mine; it is the way I write. ¹⁸ The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.
 - <u>Romans 16:22</u>—*I Tertius, who wrote this letter, greet you...*
 - Paul usually dictated his letters to an *amanuenses* but wrote concluding words in his own hand.
 - <u>Galatians 6:11</u>—See with what large letters I am writing to you with my own hand.
 - Philemon 1.19—I, Paul, write this with my own hand . . .

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

Q10 – What NT books do we know Paul *actually wrote*?

Prevalence of amanuenses answers objections of textual critics

Example of Critics—"1 & 2 Peter were not written by Peter"
"1 Peter is polished Greek. 2 Peter is not."
"A Galilean fisherman couldn't write Greek so well"
"Use (or disuse) of the Greek Septuagint argues against..."
Thus, these books are not a trustworthy guide

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Response—

<u>1 Peter 5:12</u>—By Silvanus, a faithful brother as I regard him, I have written briefly to you . . .

 Of course a rough Galilean fisherman is going to sound different on paper with an amanuensis

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

- Conclusion / Thesis—
 - Stylistic variations are due to variations in scribes not authors

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Paul uses several amanuenses

- Tertius Romans (16.22)
- Sosthenes 1 Corinthians 1:1—Paul & our brother Sosthenes
- Timothy 2 Cor (1.1), Philippians (1.1), Colossians (1.1), 1 & 2 Thessalonians (1 Thess 1.1; 2 Thess 1.1), Philemon (1.1)
- Silvanus or Silas 1 & 2 Thessalonians (with Timothy)
- Tychicus? "...will make all things known to you..." (Eph 6.21)

Luke – Paul last 4 (60's AD) – tradition: failing eyesight

I & 2 Timothy (4.11); Titus? (3.15-all who are with me send greetings); Hebrews? (tradition)


- Silvanus/Silas 1 Peter (5.12) *by Silvanus…I have written…*
- John Mark Gospel of Mark (per tradition)

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- John per tradition:
 - Prochorus Acts 6.5—3rd deacon ... Greek speaking Jew



<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

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John

Prochorus – John's scribe per tradition; Acts 6.5—3rd deacon; a Greek speaking Jew

John's Gospel – 3rd person to 1st person indicates a scribe

- 21.24—"This is the disciple who is bearing witness about these things, and who has written these things; and we know that his testimony is true"
- Probably the scribe for Revelation

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

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Textual critics seek to deny divine authorship of Scripture. But:
 <u>2 Timothy 3:16</u>—*All Scripture is breathed out by God.*

 <u>2 Pet 1.21</u>—no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit

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Authors of the New Testament

- Apostle Matthew (Levi) Matthew
- John Mark Mark (from Peter's accounts)
- Dr. Luke Luke & Acts
- Apostle John John; 1, 2, 3 John; Revelation
- Apostle Peter 1 & 2 Peter (and Mark's Gospel)
- James, Jesus' brother (Jerusalem Church leader-Acts 15) James
- Jude/Judah (Jesus & James' brother-Mt 13.55; Mk 6.3) Jude
- Apostle Paul Romans thru Philemon. Hebrews?

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

Q10 – What NT books do we know Paul *actually wrote*?

Hebrews? – anonymous

- Affirms Paul
 - Immersed in OT's theology & Christo-centricity/-telicity
 - 13.22-23—pastoral concern for readers ... mentions Timothy
 - IO.32 ff—knows his readers' stories of faith & trial
 - 2 Peter 3.15—[writing to Hebrews] ... Paul also wrote you ...
 - Early (Clement, 150AD; Origen, 185) & 5th-16th C. Church

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Questions Paul

- Other early suggestions—Tertullian (155AD): Barnabas; others (95): Luke, Clement of Rome.
- Reformation—Luther: Apollos
- Style, teaching method, Septuagint usage are unlike his letters
 - Perhaps a sermon, later transcribed by Luke?

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

Q11 – What's a woman's role in ministry in light of 1 Timothy 2.12?

- <u>1 Tim 2.8-14</u> I desire that in every place [of worship] the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarreling; ⁹ likewise also that women should adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control, not with braided hair and gold or pearls or costly attire, ¹⁰ but with what is proper for women who profess godliness—with good works. ¹¹Let a woman learn quietly with all submissiveness. ¹² I do not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man; rather, she is to remain quiet. ¹³ For Adam was formed first, then Eve; ¹⁴ and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor.
- <u>1 Tim 3.14-15</u> I am writing these things to you so that...you may know how one ought to behave in the household of God

<u>Bible & Interpretation</u>

Q11 – What's a <u>woman's role in ministry</u> in light of <u>1 Timothy</u> <u>2.12</u>?

- PCA 2017 <u>Study Report</u> on Women Serving in Ministry (63 pgs)
 - Especially pages: 16-21, 51, 56-57, 59
 - pcahistory.org PCA Digest & Studies 1973-2021 (over 40)
- Context is <u>Worship</u> Word + Sacrament (Pulpit + Table)
 - The *prayer* it mentions is the Eucharist prayer, which is:
 - In Persona Christi (Latin: in the person of Christ)
 - Celebrant sacramentally represents/communicates Jesus
 - This is my body ... this is my blood
 - A woman celebrating in persona Christi ("this is my body") would confuse (obscure) the sacramental representation
 - God the Son perfectly images & reveals the Father in flesh
 - God the Father is masculine as to all Creation ... & vice-versa
