Lesson 1 – The Bible

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Week 1 – Growing in Grace through God’s Word

The journey of discipleship is one of the most exciting and rewarding experiences for a believer. It is a journey of growing in God’s grace and deepening your relationship with the Savior. As we begin this journey, I am reminded of the powerful words from 2 Peter 3:18 – “But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and forever. Amen.” This verse captures the essence of discipleship—growth in grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Discipleship begins with salvation. The moment you accept Jesus Christ as your Savior, you enter into a personal relationship with Him. But salvation is not the end; it is the beginning of a lifelong process of learning what it means to follow Jesus in obedience and growth. Jesus Himself described this process in John 8:31 – “If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed.” True discipleship involves a commitment to God’s Word. It is through His Word that we learn to walk with Him, grow spiritually, and live a life that glorifies Him.

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The Bible: Our Sole Authority

The Bible is our guide and the sole authority for our faith and practice. As Christians, everything we believe, and practice is rooted in the Scriptures. Let’s start by understanding how the Bible is structured. The Bible contains 66 books divided into two main sections: the Old Testament and the New Testament.

The Old Testament was written before Jesus Christ came to earth, and it sets the stage for His coming. The New Testament, on the other hand, tells us about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, as well as the spread of the gospel in the first century after His ascension. Together, these two sections provide the complete story of God’s redemptive plan for humanity.

It is also important to understand that the Bible is not organized chronologically but categorically. It is arranged by subjects, which helps us understand its teachings in a structured way. For instance, the Old Testament includes categories like the Law, history, poetry, and prophecy. The New Testament includes the Gospels, history (Acts), the epistles (letters), and prophecy (Revelation). This categorical arrangement makes the Bible a rich and diverse library of God’s revelation to us.

Trusting God's Word

The Bible is not just an ordinary book; it is the inspired Word of God. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 declares, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." This means that every word of Scripture is God-breathed and serves a purpose in equipping us for a life of faith and obedience. As we embark on this discipleship journey, let's commit to making God's Word the foundation of our lives. Psalm 119:105 beautifully describes the role of Scripture: "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." Just as a lamp provides guidance in darkness, the Bible illuminates our path and helps us navigate life's challenges.

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The Bible is the Word of God

Who wrote the Bible? – In the simplest terms, God is the sole author of the Bible. This is why we hold the Bible as the ultimate authority for our faith and practice. Everything we believe and do as Christians is grounded in its truths. To understand how God gave us the Bible, we'll examine two key concepts: *revelation* and *inspiration*.

A. Revelation: God Communicating Truth

Revelation is God's act of communicating previously unknown truth to humanity. Throughout history, God has revealed Himself in various ways—through creation, our conscience, and historical events. However, the clearest and most complete revelation of God is found in the pages of Scripture.

The Apostle Peter emphasizes this in 2 Peter 1:19-21:

"We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place, until the day dawn, and the day star arise in your hearts. Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

Peter, who had witnessed the glorified Christ firsthand, describes Scripture as a "more sure word of prophecy." That means the written Word of God is completely reliable and trustworthy. With God's revelation recorded for us in black and white, we can have absolute confidence in its truth.

B. Inspiration: God Recording Truth

Inspiration refers to the process by which God ensured His truth was written down. Peter explains this process in verse 21, stating that holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost.

Let's unpack this verse to understand how the Bible came to be:

1. The Bible Did Not Originate With Humans

Peter writes, "The prophecy came not in old time by the will of man." The Bible is not a product of human invention or imagination. It did not arise from human ideas or desires but from God Himself. This divine origin sets Scripture apart from all other writings.

2. God Used Humans to Record His Words

Although the Bible did not originate with humans, God used human instruments to pen its words. Peter continues, "Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." These men were inspired by God's Spirit to write exactly what He intended. This ensures that every word of Scripture is divinely authoritative and free from error.

3. God Is the Ultimate Author

While human writers physically recorded the Bible, its ultimate author is God. The Holy Spirit guided the process, ensuring the final product reflects God's perfect will. This divine authorship is what makes the Bible unique, trustworthy, and powerful.

Why It Matters

Understanding that the Bible is God's Word changes how we approach it. It's not just a collection of ancient texts or moral teachings; it's the very voice of God speaking to us.

As Paul writes in 2 Timothy 3:16-17: "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

The Bible is profitable for every aspect of our lives. It teaches us what is true, corrects our wrongs, and trains us in righteousness so we can live out God's purpose.

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Bible Is God Breathed:

From Genesis to Revelation, the Bible is entirely God's Word. The biblical term for this process is *inspiration*, and one key verse explains this truth clearly: "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." (2 Timothy 3:16)

This verse is crucial to understanding the nature of the Bible. If you have a habit of memorizing Scripture, I strongly encourage you to commit this verse to heart, as it will serve as a cornerstone of your faith.

What Does “Inspiration” Mean?

In our modern English language, we often use the word *inspiration* to refer to a creative motivation. We say things like, “*I was inspired to paint this*” or “*Shakespeare was inspired as he wrote Romeo and Juliet*.” However, that is not the meaning of *inspiration* in 2 Timothy 3:16.

There is another, less commonly used definition of *inspiration*—one that refers to the act of drawing air into the lungs, inhaling or breathing in. This is the meaning used in Scripture. The phrase “*given by inspiration of God*” literally means *God-breathed*.

This means that every word of Scripture was breathed out by God Himself. The Bible was not the product of human wisdom or creativity; it was divinely communicated to chosen men, who faithfully recorded what God had spoken. The Holy Spirit moved upon these writers, ensuring that what they wrote was exactly what God intended.

The Bible: Our Divine Authority

Since the Bible is God-breathed, it carries absolute authority over our lives. According to 2 Timothy 3:16, Scripture is profitable for:

1. **Doctrine** – Teaching us what is true.
2. **Reproof** – Correcting us when we are wrong.
3. **Correction** – Guiding us back onto the right path.
4. **Instruction in righteousness** – Teaching us how to live a godly life.

The Bible is not just an ancient book—it is the living Word of God, given to equip us for every good work (2 Timothy 3:17). It is our foundation for faith, our source of truth, and our guide for daily living.

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If we truly desire to know Christ, we must know His Word. Since Jesus *is* the Word, drawing closer to Him means drawing deeper into Scripture. As we grow in our understanding of God’s Word, we will grow in our faith, in our relationship with Christ, and in our ability to live according to His will.
