Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might. Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God: Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; And for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel, For which I am an ambassador in bonds: that therein I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak.

Lexham Geographic Commentary on Acts through Revelation Training and Equipment in the Roman Army

Training and Equipment in the Roman Army

Roman soldiers won so many battles because they were well trained and highly disciplined. They were first and foremost fighting men, and physical fitness was essential. New recruits were drilled in the rigors of running, jumping, climbing over obstacles, and marching. Paul recognized the hard training of Roman soldiers when he wrote to Timothy, "Suffer hardship with me, as a good soldier of Christ Jesus" (2 Tim 2:3).

Roman soldiers practiced the actual movements they would use in battle. They learned how to march in straight lines, turn from a column to a battle line, open and close ranks, form a wedge to break through enemy lines, and form a circle or "orb" (orbis) with their shields if surrounded by the enemy. One of the most famous of the Roman soldiers' formations was the testudo, which enabled them to advance slowly with protecting shields on all sides and over their heads. Soldiers practiced hand-to-hand combat with wicker shields and wooden swords to avoid injury. Their constant drill with swords, shields, and spears made the Roman soldiers experts in the art of warfare.

Roman Testudo (Tortoise) Formation

The Jewish historian Josephus lauds the peacetime training for Roman soldiers. He writes:

For their nation does not wait for the outbreak of war to give men their first lesson in arms; they do not sit with folded hands in peace time only to put them in motion in the hour of need. On the contrary, as though they had been born with weapons in hand, they never have a truce from training, never wait for emergencies to arise. Moreover, their peace maneuvers are no less strenuous than veritable warfare; each soldier daily throws all his energy into his drill, as though he were in action. Hence that perfect ease with which they sustain the

shock of battle; no confusion breaks their customary formations, no panic paralyses, no fatigue exhausts them; and as their opponents cannot match these qualities, victory is the invariable and certain consequence. Indeed, it would not be wrong to describe their maneuvers as bloodless combats and their combats as sanguinary maneuvers.

A few paragraphs later, Josephus adds:

This perfect discipline makes the army an ornament of peace-time and in war welds the whole into a single body; so compact are their ranks, so alert their movements in wheeling to right or left, so quick their ears for orders, their eyes for signals, their hands to act upon them ... no wonder that the empire has extended its boundaries on the east to the Euphrates, on the west to the ocean, on the south to the most fertile tracts of Libya, on the north to the Ister and the Rhine. One might say without exaggeration that, great as are their possessions, the people that won them are greater still.

In addition to his weapons and shield, a fully equipped Roman soldier carried about ninety pounds of tools and military gear. Most important was the soldier's helmet, which was made of bronze over a leather skullcap. The helmet had hinged cheek pieces and a curved extension that provided protection for the soldier's neck. Wearing a helmet was a distinct advantage, since their enemies had no such protection. Body armor protected the upper part of the soldier's body, front and back. Strips of metal were secured with leather cords to create something like a vest—with the front and back buckled together, allowing the soldier's arms to move freely. Around his waist, the soldier wore a wide belt with thick leather strips hanging down in front. The belt protected the soldier's groin and thighs while allowing for freedom of movement. Sturdy sandals were especially important for soldiers, who traveled on foot. A legionary wore sandals with thick leather soles and hobnails to help avoid slipping in a muddy and bloody battlefield. Strips were worn inside the sandals during wintry conditions. For protection, Roman soldiers had shields, which consisted of laminated wood covered with tough leather and trimmed around the edges with iron or bronze.

Shields were curved, offering protection not only in front but on the sides of the soldier. The apostle Paul uses the familiar images of the Roman military equipment to teach the Ephesians lessons of spiritual warfare (Eph 6:10–17).
