Main Idea:

Subject (What is the passage about?): Why Paul wants to send Timothy and Epaphroditus to the Church in Philippi.

Complement (What does the passage say about the subject?): Because Timothy is like a son to him, he has imitated Paul in his care for the saints, and will be genuinely concerned for them. Epaphroditus is a like a brother to him and nearly died for the work of Christ. They should rejoice in seeing him again, and honor men like him.

Theological Main Idea: Those who serve selflessly and courageously for Christ are to be imitated and honored.

Homiletical Main Idea: The Christlikeness we see in others is worthy of imitation and honor.

1. Timothy, a son of proven worth who served selflessly (vv. 19-24)

Philippians 2:17-18 - ¹⁷ Even if I am to be poured out as a drink offering upon the sacrificial offering of your faith, I am glad and rejoice with you all. ¹⁸ Likewise you also should be glad and rejoice with me.

2 Timothy 3:10-11 - ¹⁰ You, however, have followed my teaching, my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness, ¹¹ my persecutions and sufferings that happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium, and at Lystra—which persecutions I endured; yet from them all the Lord rescued me.

1 Corinthians 11:1 - Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.

2. Epaphroditus, a brother worthy of honor who risked his life (vv. 25-30)

Philippians 4:14-18 - ¹⁴ Yet it was kind of you to share my trouble. ¹⁵ And you Philippians yourselves know that in the beginning of the gospel, when I left Macedonia, no church entered into partnership with me in giving and receiving, except you only. ¹⁶ Even in Thessalonica you sent me help for my needs once and again. ¹⁷ Not that I seek the gift, but I seek the fruit that increases to your credit. ¹⁸ I have received full payment, and more. I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God.

1 Corinthians 16:15-18 - ¹⁵ Now I urge you, brothers—you know that the household of Stephanas were the first converts in Achaia, and that they have devoted themselves to the service of the saints— ¹⁶ be subject to such as these, and to every fellow worker and laborer. ¹⁷ I rejoice at the coming of Stephanas and Fortunatus and Achaicus, because they have made up for your absence, ¹⁸ for they refreshed my spirit as well as yours. Give recognition to such people.
